

close the highly successful business because of Dina's passing.

The store remains under the management of Linda Wagers, who is selling the last of the inventory. Precisely when the store will close depends on when the inventory is sold off, according to former city of Berea Tourism Director Belle Jackson, who is the younger sister of both Jimmy Lou and Dinah.

While some of the items in Honeysuckle Vine have been moved over to the nearby Lindsay Gallery on North Broadway Street, Wagers said she expects Tyree's watercolors and other items to sell very well before she finally closes the store.

"This is the time to come and get some of Dinah's work," Wagers said.

Motorcoach Coordinator Emily Reynolds said there is some degree of uncertainty since Tyree's death, and that the next use of the building has yet to be decided.

"We can't really look to far into that [the future of the barn] until everything with that business is figured out," Reynolds told commissioners.

The imminent closing of Honeysuckle Vine had an immediate impact on commerce in Old Town. Lindsay Gallery had directly benefitted from foot traffic into that store from Honeysuckle Vine, which is

connected to Lindsay Gallery. With the future closing of Honeysuckle, Lindsay Gallery owner Bob Mattingly elected to relocate to a space in the old Berea Hotel building, which had been designated as the Corner Gallery to display local works of art.

The larger space draws more foot traffic for Lindsay, but more importantly, Reynolds said it gives Mattingly more space to host artisan demonstrations for tourists, who bring money into the local economy when they visit as part of motorcoach tours.

In the meantime, the art work that had been on display in the corner gallery has since been moved to the Berea Welcome Center.

Fraley said Mattingly's

relocation is a logical move that may make Old Town more tourist-friendly.

"From my perspective, it's better to have a full-time business owner and a full-time person we can rely on to demonstrate and to show his craft in that corner as opposed to maybe just having displays there," Fraley said.

The artwork currently on display in the Welcome Center in Old Town is for sale. Reynolds said in the future, that art may be displayed in the Berea Gallery and Events Center, which is slated to open next month.

In other action, the commission voted unanimously to reuse a portion of approximately \$200,000 that is budgeted for the purchase of a tourism trolley. They voted instead to buy

- (1) Add Community Uses as Conditionally Permitted Use in an I-2 (Industrial Park District) Zone;
- (2) Add Light Manufacturing as a Permitted Use in an I-2 (Industrial Park District) Zone: and
- (3) Add Light Warehousing as a Permitted Use in an I-2 (Industrial Park District) Zone

a multi-passenger van, which would be wrapped with a Berea Tourism livery and used to ferry visitors around town.

Commission chair Bill West said there's still a demand for a trolley that can serve as an added attraction to bring visitors into town, but he ultimately agreed to purchase a van as an interim step.

"I think what you do is get the van now and don't take the trolley off the table," West said.

Turning to budget matters, West alluded to an upcoming budget session, expressing his concern that there may be a need to cut the tourism personnel budget in the face of national economic uncertainty, which tends to negatively impact tourist spending.

Reynolds noted that, so far, she has received fewer commitments from motorcoaches to date compared to last year. West said that might be attributed to a shift in consumer confidence, but Reynolds said she hasn't yet received notice of cancelations for motorcoach visits to the city.

Commissioner Donna Brewer noted that revenue for the Boone Tavern Inn is significantly off when compared to numbers at this same last year.

The next tourism business session is slated for May 14.
