given his role as an elected official representing District 2. These charges followed earlier accusations in 2020 when Butner was charged with theft and trespassing related to an incident on Poor House Road. While those charges were later dismissed and expunged, they were reported on at the time by this newspaper.

Our October 2024 article referenced these 2020 allegations to provide readers with a complete context of Butner's legal history. Shortly after publication, Butner's attorney, Ephraim Helton, demanded a retraction, claiming the mention of expunged charges violated Kentucky Revised Statute 431.076. Helton asserted that expungement statutes render such records legally nonexistent and should prohibit their inclusion in public discourse.

The Central Record respectfully declined this request. Kentucky's expungement laws apply to court and agency records, not to historical reporting by independent media outlets. Our stance is clear: expungement does not erase facts, nor does it negate the public's right to understand patterns of behavior by elected representatives.

Moreover, Butner is a public figure, and his conduct directly affects the citizens he serves. When a sitting magistrate faces repeated legal challenges involving alleged theft,

it becomes a matter of legitimate public concern. Voters have a right to evaluate their leaders with as much information as possible. Suppressing these facts would undermine the integrity of public discourse and deny the public the transparency they deserve.

We stand by our decision to report the facts, including details of Butner's 2020 charges. This is not an act of defiance but a reaffirmation of journalistic principles. Public accountability is the cornerstone of democracy, and as a newspaper with a 135-year history in this community, it is our duty to uphold it.

Attempts to silence truthful reporting through legal threats are troubling.

Kentucky's anti-SLAPP law protects journalists from such tactics, ensuring that discussions of public interest remain uninhibited. While we understand the sensitivities surrounding expunged records, these cannot override the critical need for transparency in matters involving elected officials.

The Central Record remains committed to its role as a watchdog for the people of Garrard County. Our readers deserve the truth, and we will continue to provide it, undeterred by intimidation or legal maneuvering. Transparency is not just our duty-it is our promise.
