sion on the history, purpose, and potential implications of allowing these colors to be used in school uniforms and other representations. The discussion regarding school colors was prompted by ongoing concerns about the lack of consistency in uniforms and school branding. Over the years, various athletic teams and booster clubs had introduced non-approved colors into uniforms and apparel, leading to confusion about what was officially acceptable. The primary colors for both schools—cardinal red and gold—have historically defined the district’s identity. However, inconsistencies in uniform colors have resulted in a loss of uniformity across different sports and activities. Superintendent discussions and board member input indi-

cated that the introduction of secondary colors would provide clearer guidance for teams, coaches, and booster organizations. The goal is to ensure that while teams have flexibility in design, the schools’ traditional colors remain prominent. Before the vote, board members shared differing opinions on the proposal. Some members emphasized the importance of maintaining the schools’ historical colors, while others acknowledged the practical benefits of allowing black and gray as secondary options. Dr. Jerry Browning noted that over time, various shades of red have been used, creating inconsistencies. He recalled past difficulties in ordering uniforms that matched the intended cardinal red and stated that allowing secondary colors could help address these challenges.

Mr. Kenneth Hurt, who made the motion to approve the addition of secondary colors, explained that the intent was not to replace the traditional colors but to provide a framework that would prevent further deviations. He expressed concerns about teams adopting entirely black uniforms, stressing that any use of black or gray should be as a secondary accent rather than a dominant color. Ms. Mary Davis seconded the motion and supported the idea that the board needed to set clear guidelines to maintain institutional control over uniform colors. She suggested that if teams began to shift too far from the primary colors, the board should revisit the decision. Mr. Ethan Smith, the only board member to vote against the motion, raised concerns about the potential for black and gray to overshadow the

primary colors. He acknowledged that all-black uniforms are popular among students but emphasized that they should not become the standard. He also suggested that if the policy led to a widespread adoption of black in uniforms, the board should consider reversing the decision. There was also discussion about whether the new color policy would apply only to game uniforms or also to practice apparel. Board members agreed that practice uniforms are generally less regulated, with teams having more flexibility in what they wear. However, if a school or team provides practice uniforms, they should align with the approved color scheme. The decision to approve black and gray as secondary colors does not mandate their use but allows them to be incorporated into uniforms and other school-related designs.

Board members emphasized that the primary colors—cardinal red and gold—must remain the dominant visual elements in all official representations. To prevent future confusion, board members suggested that principals, athletic directors, and coaches should ensure that uniforms adhere to the approved guidelines. Some members also recommended that teams seeking to introduce new uniforms should present designs to the board for review before they are finalized. Additionally, the board acknowledged that the policy could be revisited if concerns arise over its implementation. Several members stated that if black or gray became too prominent in uniforms or if the community expressed dissatisfaction, the board could amend or revoke the decision. The motion was approved

with four votes in favor and one against. Dr. Jerry Browning, Mr. Kenneth Hurt, Dr. Connie Lamb, and Ms. Mary Davis voted yes, while Mr. Ethan Smith voted no. With the board’s approval, athletic teams and school organizations now have the option to incorporate black and gray as secondary colors while maintaining cardinal red and gold as the primary colors. The decision provides greater flexibility in uniform design while ensuring that the schools’ traditional identity remains intact. However, board members made it clear that the policy could be revisited if concerns arise about its implementation. The meeting concluded with the approval of this action item before the board moved into an executive session.
