cated that the introduction of secondary colors would provide clearer guidance for teams, coaches, and booster organizations. The goal is to ensure that while teams have flexibility in design, the schools' traditional colors remain prominent.

Before the vote, board members shared differing opinions on the proposal. Some members emphasized the importance of maintaining the schools' historical colors. while others acknowledged the practical benefits of allowing black and gray as secondary options.

Dr. Jerry Browning noted that over time, various shades of red have been used, creating inconsistencies. He recalled past difficulties in ordering uniforms that matched the intended cardinal red and stated that allowing secondary colors could help address these challenges.

Mr. Kenneth Hurt, who made the motion to approve the addition of secondary colors, explained that the intent was not to replace the traditional colors but to provide a framework that would prevent further deviations. He expressed concerns about teams adopting entirely black uniforms, stressing that any use of black or gray should be as a secondary accent rather than a dominant color.

Ms. Mary Davis seconded the motion and supported the idea that the board needed to set clear guidelines to maintain institutional control over uniform colors. She suggested that if teams began to shift too far from the primary colors, the board should revisit the decision

Board members emphasized that the primary colors-cardinal red and gold-must remain the dominant visual elements in all official representations.

To prevent future confusion, board members suggested that principals, athletic directors, and coaches should ensure that uniforms adhere to the approved guidelines. Some members also recommended that teams seeking to introduce new uniforms should present designs to the board for review before they are finalized.

Additionally, the board acknowledged that the policy could be revisited if concerns arise over its implementation. Several members stated that if black or gray became too prominent in uniforms or if the community expressed dissatisfaction, the board could amend or revoke the decision.
