


ANNE

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Rail crossing repair scheduled for April

CSX Transportation has scheduled railroad crossing repairs the week of April 8 at the Elliston-Mt. Zion Road (KY 1942) crossing between the 1.9 and 2.2 mile points. These repairs will require temporary closures for approximately two to four days.

Work is scheduled to take place Tuesday through Friday, though dates are subject to change due to weather and other unforeseen factors.

Signed detours will be in place at all locations, and message boards will be posted at most sites to provide advance notice of closures and expected timeframes. Any questions about the crossing repairs should be directed toward CSX Transportation.

The date, time, and duration of work may be adjusted if inclement weather or other unforeseen delays occur.

Big day at Grant County Park planned for April 12

On Saturday, April 12. Grant County Parks and Recreation will be hosting two big events at Grant County Park.

The fun begins with a pair of Easter egg hunts, at 9:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.

There are egg hunts for three age groups at each time slot: 1-3 years; 4-6 years; and 7-10 years. Participants are asked to choose one hunt.

From 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., the park will also be celebrating opening day for Grant County Little League.

The festival will take place in the middle of the park, starting in the vicinity of the stage.

Community Coordinator Chris Alstott said there will be three food trucks (food, coffee and dessert), 40 craft vendors and a kids zone with inflatables.

Absent Dawn will be onstage providing live music.

The Opening Day Parade will take place at noon and will include both the Cincinnati Reds' and the Florence Y'Alls' mascots.

The events will take place rain or shine but will be cancelled if the weather is severe. There is no rain out date.

Grant County Park is located at 144 South Main Street in Crittenden.
