SURPLUS PROPERTIES

Items from the Road Department, Animal Shelter, Building Inspector's Office, Sheriff's Office and Detention Center were approved as surplus and will be sold at a county auction on Oct. 25 at 10 a.m. at the County Road Department Barn, 505 Hopperton Lane,

Judge/Executive Chuck Dills noted that computer items would be "destroyed and the rest ... sold at public auction.'

A Bid Committee meeting held Council unanimously approved to earlier in the day yielded a list of 11 roads to be submitted to the state for consideration of repaving. They are

Site plans are detailed blueprints that highlight the key features of a proposed site for planning purposes. These must be detailed enough to be included in the planning permit from planning and zoning.

At this meeting, Longnecks Sports Grill, which has locations in Wilder, Hebron and Richwood, was applying to site a new location in Dry Ridge. They are planning to build behind Walmart in a free standing structure that will share a part of their parking with the Holiday Inn Express.
