The result is a growing number of Americans, almost 70 million, who live in a "news desert"-a community with no local news source. Most of those shuttered papers are weeklies covering smaller communi-

The newspapers have been such an important solidifying part of our small communities. It's hard to imagine not having them. So many people look forward to going over the local papers from front to back every week. It has a unifying effect. It brings us together, and keeps us abreast of what's going on. It's part of our small towns.

I do hope that never changes!

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
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


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
