75 YEARS AGO THE BRECKENRIDGE NEWS November 30, 1950

Marshall Barnes, Owensboro, President of the Kentucky Bankers Association, announces the appointment of Paul Lewis, Vice President, Breckinridge Bank of Cloverport, as County Agricultural Chairman for Breckinridge County. The appointment becomes effective immediately for the year 1951.

Snow started falling in the county and soon covered the roads making travel hazardous. Many people who had departed for the Thanksgiving holiday were delayed in returning home and several had to leave their cars and return by train. The weather station at Dam 45, Addison, recorded four and one-half inches of snow, but in many places the wind drifted it much deeper. A temperature low of 4 degrees below zero was recorded on the 25th.

William Jennings, with the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company from Owensboro, will move to Hardinsburg where he will be installer and repairman for the Hardinsburg area. Russell James, presently handling this, has been promoted and will be in charge of the Cloverport and Hawesville areas. The Company has recently completed a new submarine cable across the Ohio River at Hawesville. The cable cost approximately \$8,000 but no estimate was available on installation costs.

The 1975 burley tobacco market in Kentucky and Indiana opened Nov. 24 with prices somewhat lower than last year's record-setting \$108 per hundred. Speculation as to what caused the decline varied around the state, but a sharp decline in foreign exports was one thing which was blamed.

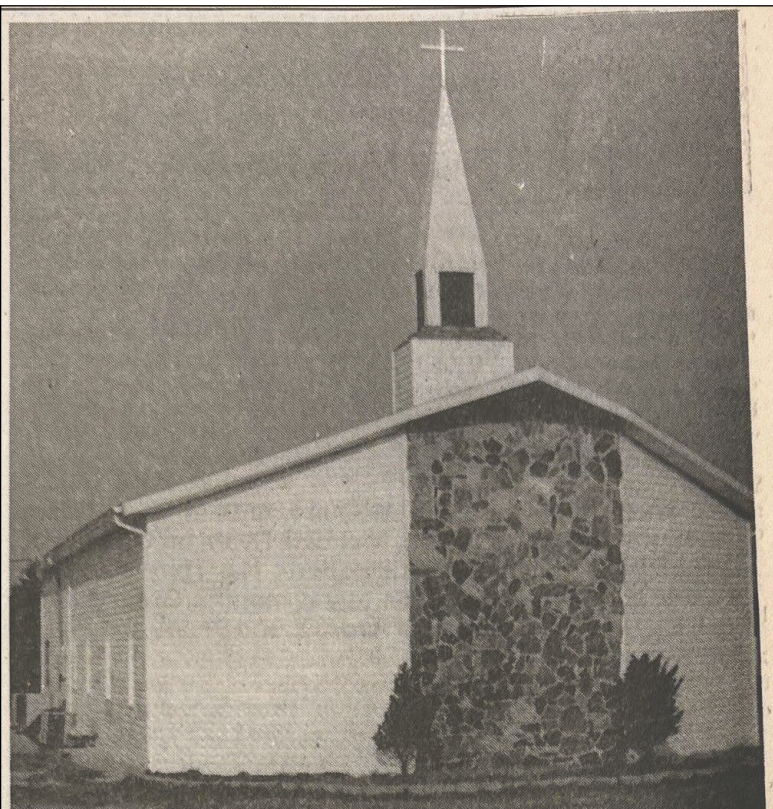

Advanced Life Support will soon be available by the Breck Central Ambulance Service. This will be available for the entire county 24 hours per day, seven days per week, 375 days a year. There will be four paramedics available and all ALS runs will have one paramedic and one emergency medical technician aboard.

The Breckinridge Memorial Hospital board of trustees attended their monthly meeting. New to the agenda was a report by DeDe Hall concerning the human resources / personnel area of the hospital. According to Hall, the October report reflected a total number of employees as 191. Of these, 84 are regular, full time employees; 83 are regular part time employees; 24 are employed on an as needed basis; and nine are contracted. During October, the hospital experienced four hirings, three leaves of absence, and two resignations.

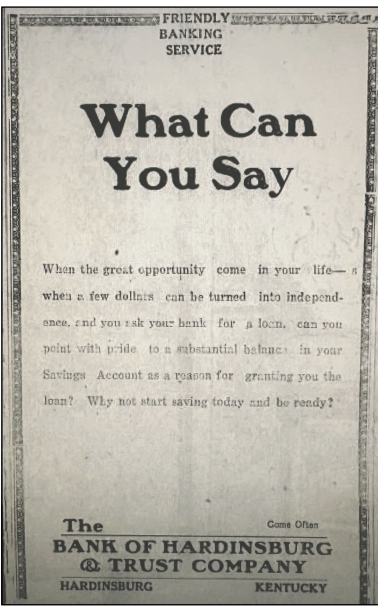

The Breckinridge-Grayson Programs held the official ribbon cutting for the new addition on their building Nov. 13. The building, located on Tules Creek

Road, is the Breckinridge branch of the Head Start program facility out of Leitchfield. The program serves low income families and provides early childhood development programs to those families, as well as family support. With the new addition, the Breckinridge County branch can now serve 40 children in their homes and eight in the classroom at the center.

At the regular meeting of the Cloverport Board of Education, superintendent Keith Haynes told the board that the ongoing construction project at the school should be completed by Christmas break.

The Friends of Rough River Lake met and elected officers for 2016. A slate of new officers was approved and they will assume their offices at next month's meeting. They include Charlie Corbett, president; David Dillman, vice president; Cathy Corbett, treasurer; and Lillian Warren, secretary. Shirley Galloway will serve as administrative historian.
