During Thursday's Board of Education meeting, Kevin Hitchell with Alliance Co. gave a construction update to the board on the new Christian County High School.

Hitchell said they are "hitting some big milestones", specifically mentioning the Agriculture Academy being close to completion, the auxiliary gym installing equipment and putting in basketball goals, rock being placed in parking lot two, windows beginning to be installed, and the main gym has started to be painted.

He also brought seven change orders, which included adding a second dumpster to be installed at the high school for better accessibility. The total cost will be \$4,625.
