### Fiscal Court reverses decision on New Hope property

On Tuesday, Nelson County Fiscal Court approved a zoning change for a property in New Hope, overriding the decision made by the Joint City-County

In their regularly scheduled meeting earlier this week, Fiscal Court overturned a recommendation handed down by the Planning Commission for a piece of land near Walter Hall Road and Coon Hollow Road. During the public hearing, neighbors of the property spoke against the zoning change, stating a number of concerns.

Thomas Hamilton, attorney representing the owner, spoke and presented evidence to the court in favor of approving

the change. The change asked for the property in New Hope to move from an A-1 Agriculture to an A-1 Ag Planned Unit Development or PUD.

Hamilton explained the property owner is requesting the change to be able to divide a portion of the land into 13 oneacre tracts. It would be part of a larger 70-acre plot, which would be put into a conservation easement to protect the remaining land.

#### Defense says prosecutor ambushing deputy

**Pretrial** conference set for Sept. 19

Attorney Michael Niemietz, who is defending Nelson County Sheriff's Chief Deputy Brandon Bryan in a whistleblower case, filed a motion last week requesting Special Prosecutor Amanda Hernandez Troutman to identify the documents she plans to use in the state's case against Bryan and Sheriff Ramon Pineiroa.

That motion is set to be considered Monday morning by Special Judge Elise Givhan Spainhour, a Bullitt County Family Court Judge appointed to the case. Hernandez Troutman is in the Bullitt County Commonwealth's Attorney appointed to prosecute the case.

Spainhour has set a Friday, Sept. 19, date at 10 a.m. for a pretrial conference.

Bryan and Pineiroa are under indictment for charges of abuse of public trust, theft by deception and official misconduct in a whistleblower case where NCSO Detectives Ian Justice and Will Purdom

## Indigent status lets Lawson's appeal go forward

Darren Wolff, who was appointed along with Zach Buckler to represent Steve Lawson in May's Crystal Rogers murder case trial, has filed a motion with Nelson Circuit Court to proceed with an appeal of Lawson's conviction and prison sentence.

Lawson was convicted of conspiracy to murder and tampering with evidence in the 2015 disappearance of Rogers. He was sentenced to 17 years in jail for his

crime, and was recently moved from the overcrowded Nelson County Jail to the LaRue County

Detention Center. Wolff and Buckler were appointed to represent Steve Lawson last year after he fired his original defense attorney, Ted Lavit. In Wolff's motion, he asks for the court to proceed "in forma pauperis" on appeal, since the condition of Lawson's indigent status has not changed, since he has been incarcerated for nearly two
