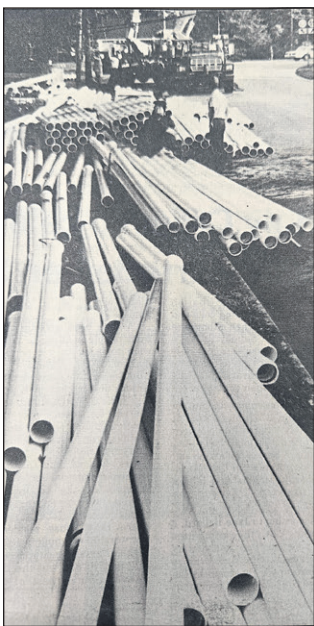


TURNING BACK THE PAGES

Knights shock Collins
Though some games have been bigger in scale and more meaningful, the Marion County High School's win over Collins on Friday might have been the biggest win in the last seven years.
Marion County kept Collins off the field long enough to grab a 30-27 win, knocking off the team that some have picked to win the Class AAAA state title.
"I really truly think that's one of the biggest wins in our program," Knights Head Coach Jeff Robbins said. "We've played in bigger games but this was a huge, huge game."
Junior Austin Turner gave the Knights the upper hand with 48 seconds left in the third quarter when he bobbled a Collins pass and turned it into an acrobatic interception on the Knights eight-yard line.
Turner stopped a drive that would have put Collins ahead by as many as six points, exorcising the demons of a porous pass defense last season that fell to a pass happy Lone Oak squad in the state final four.
From there, the Knights' pounding offense took over. Marion

County conducted a masterful drive, running the clock and working the Collins' defense for a 14 play, 76-yard drive that ended in a 14-yard run by Joseph Buster Hazelwood with 15:52 left in the game, Clayton Smith charged into the end zone for a two-point conversion to put the Knights up 30-20.

"We picked up 27 first downs. That's huge,"

he said. "We hope to average 12 to 15 a game, and we doubled that up. That's huge for us." The Knights ran 76 plays from scrimmage for 388 rushing yards and 24 passing yards. Their objective going into the game was to control the line of scrimmage.
"I give us an A+ for controlling the line," Robbins said. "We said all week we wanted to approach this game like the Western game last year keeping their offense off the field. I thought Coach Epps did heck of a job calling the offense tonight. Of course, Robby Peterson did a good job with game plan."
Hazelwood led the Knights offense, which was without Jordan Bell and Jeremy Mattingly for most of the game, with 189 yards on 29 carries. Clayton Smith had 73 yards on 14 carries for the Knights. Robbins said his team's attitude was crucial in beating the favored team on Friday.

Holy Cross to celebrate its 200th birthday on Sunday
The Holy Cross parish expects to be serving cake and punch to more than a thousand 'people on Sunday. That's when the residents of Holy Cross will turn out to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the founding of their community.
The bicentennial celebration will begin at 2 p.m. in front of the Holy Cross Church where Archbishop Thomas Kelly and Bishop Charles Maloney will be celebrants of a Mass.
Numerous priests and monks are expected to attend the Mass.
According to Jane Ballard, a member of the committee working on the anniversary celebration, the mass will be followed by a reception in the School

gym. But there won't be a potluck dinner.
"We've been getting calls from people wanting to know what to bring to the potluck dinner," Mrs. Ballard said. "But we aren't going to have a potluck dinner because it'll be at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. We will be serving cake and punch though, and we're planning on more than a thousand people."
Mrs. Ballard said that the original church that served the founders of the community was a log structure that burned down. The church where Holy Cross residents now worship was built in 1823. The original log church was built in 1792 and was the first Catholic Church west of the Alleghenies. That church "led to the establishment of the first diocese west of the Alleghenies and to the establishment of 28 dioceses and more than 10,000 churches."
The log church was built the shadow of GS towering knob—the single highest knob west of the Alleghenies and the knob was later named for the man who built the church, the Rev. William de Rohan. The site of the log church is now marked by a shrine.
Many of the descendants of the original founders of Holy Cross still live in or near the community, Mrs. Ballard said, and will attend the bicentennial celebration.

BASEBALL UMPIRE DIES ON DIAMOND
Heart Attack Sunday Is Fatal To J. L. Downs, Jr., 39
A baseball game between the St. Francis and Fredericktown teams on the Loretto diamond Sunday afternoon ended abruptly in the second inning when Joseph Lawrence Downs, Jr.,

39, St. Francis, who was serving as umpire, suffered a heart attack on the field. Death was instantaneous.
He was not known to have been afflicted previously with a heart ailment. Only a few moments before the seizure he complained to one of the players near him that he was not feeling well. Several moved forward to ease him to a reclining position on the ground, when he suddenly collapsed—and was dead.
A son of Mrs. Clara Frances Mills Downs and the late Joseph Lawrence Downs, he was born in this county on December 9, 1915. Married some years ago to Miss Mary Jeanette Owens, he was the father of eight children, all under 12 years of age.
He was a member of St. Francis of Assisi Church and of its Holy Name Society. For the past 13 years he had been employed at the Blair Distilling Company.
Survivors include his mother and his wife; the children, Joseph Lawrence, Ronnie, Ann, Linda, Judy, John, Ernestine and David.
The body was at Mattingly Funeral Home until the funeral services, which were conducted by the Rev. John Talbott Spalding at 9 a.m. Wednesday at St. Francis of Assisi Church. Burial was in the church cemetery.

ATTEMPT MADE TO BREAK JAIL Floor of Cell Is Pryed Loose By Bar
ALVEY MAKES DISCOVERY
Timely discovery of an attempted jail break prevented the escape of several prisoners from the county prison the other

day, according to jailer Will Alvey. An iron cot in one of the cells was taken apart and with a bar made from one of the rods. The floor had been partly prized loose. It is said that with a few hours more work the prisoners would have been able to free themselves. Most of the work was done on a day the jailer was out of town.
The cell floors are of sheet steel and under a wash basin in the room where the prisoners were confined was a small hole that had been left for a pipe, Placing the crowbar, fashioned out of a part of the iron bed, in this hole the men had succeeded in prying the floor loose for a considerable distance. The men in the cell, according to Jailer Alvey, were Percy Steel charged with forgery; Mike Chandler, accused of larceny, and Ernest Farmer, indicted for having stolen a car belonging to Will Bright some time ago. Farmer was recently returned here from Indiana where he was arrested.
