Cissell, Reed appear in court, sentenced on sex-related charges against minors

The couple charged with sexrelated counts against minors were sentenced in Marion Circuit Court Division 1 on Sept.

Jeremy Cissell, 44, of Springfield, was sentenced by Judge Todd Spalding to 33 years in prison, while Megan Michelle Reed, 39, of Lebanon, was sentenced to 28 years. The duo pled guilty on July 7.

Cissell received 20 years on the charge of first-degree sodomy, victim under 12 years of age, three years for firstdegree sexual abuse, and 10 years for first-degree sodomy. All counts will run consecutively for 33 years.

Reed was sentenced to 20 years on the charge of firstdegree sodomy, victim under 12 years of age, five years for first-degree sexual abuse, and three years for a second charge of first-degree sexual abuse. Like Cissell, all counts will run consecutively for 28 years.

The motion of Reed for a reduction of the agreed upon sentence was denied, as the court ruled that the sentence was agreed upon as part of the plea negotiation. "The plea of guilty involved drugging iuveniles to be sexually abused by co-defendant (Cissell),' Spalding wrote. "To reduce the sentence negotiated in the plea agreement would unduly depreciate the serious nature of the offenses and send an inappropriate sentence to the community.'

Both Cissell and Reed were ordered to register as sex offenders for life.

 Franklin Otoniel Caal-Garcia was also in court, where Spalding sentenced him to 20 years. He pleaded guilty on Aug.

Caal-Garcia, 19, received 20 years each on two counts of vehicular homicide when under the influence of alcohol, and five years on the charge of theft of identity of another without consent. All counts run concurrently for a total of 20 vears

Caal-Garcia was involved in a two-car collision on Nov. 2. 2024, that claimed the life of Roy Wright, 75, and his wife, Deborah Wright, 72, both of

5 years for first-degree fleeing or evading police (motor vehicle). 5 years for first-degree wanton endangerment-police officer, 5 years for third-degree assault-police/probation officer, and 5 years for disarming a police officer. In all, Thompson will serve 20 years. The motion for probation was denied, and Spalding ruled that probating this case "would unduly depreciate the seriousness of the defendant's behavior" as the actions of Thompson on the night in question "placed law enforcement, and the community, at extreme risk."

On June 7, 2024, a KSP trooper, who was not identified, attempted to perform a traffic stop on Clarktown Road in Nelson County at 12:10 a.m. When the trooper activated his emergency equipment, the vehicle, a 2012 Chevrolet Equinox driven by Thompson, did not stop, and the pursuit ensued into Marion County when Thompson turned onto Sulphur Lick Road in the Raywick area, which is a deadend road.

Thompson exited his vehicle and fled on foot into a wooded area, where he was pursued by the trooper. After a short pursuit, the trooper was able to catch up with Thompson, who then assaulted the trooper and fled. The trooper was treated and released from the hospital.

An arrest warrant for Thompson was obtained, charging him with first-degree strangulation, first-degree assault-police officer, disarming a police officer, and theft by unlawful taking-firearm. He was located on June 7 and arrested.

 Thomas Batcher pleaded guilty and was sentenced on the following charges: A convicted felon in possession of a handgun (5 years probated for 5 years), first-degree enhancement possession of a controlled substance, first offense-methamphetamine (5 years probated for 5 years), • Dustin Thompson was convicted felon in possession sentenced to 5 years on the of a firearm (5 years probated charge of first-degree wanton for 5 years), and enhancement

months probated for 24 months). All counts will run concurrently, and he must be assessed by SSC and follow all recommendations.

His final sentencing is set for Nov. 6 at 9:00 a.m.

- Laura C. Deering's case was on the docket for a probation revocation hearing, and the parties agreed that Deering shall complete long-term treatment instead of revocation, and the completion of the treatment is now a condition of her supervision. The court also ruled that Deering will remain in custody until a treatment bed becomes avai-
- Katelyn McKenzie pleaded guilty and was sentenced on the following charges: Seconddegree unlawful transaction with a minor (2 years), first-degree possession of a controlled substance, third or greater offense, methamphetamine (3 years), and two counts of seconddegree possession of a controlled substance, drug unspecified (12 months on each count). The counts will run consecutively for 5 years. Her final sentencing was set for Oct. 23 at 9:00 a.m.
- Joseph D. Muncy was found to have violated his diversion by absconding and the parties agreed to a 90-day sanction and to dismiss the case on Nov. 6 at 9:00 a.m.
- Jordan Snow pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 5 years probated for 5 years on the charge of a convicted felon in possession of a handgun, 5 years probated for 5 years for a convicted felon in possession of a firearm, and 5 years probated for 5 years for enhancement trafficking in marijuana, less than 8 ounces, first offense. All counts will run concurrently, and Snow will serve 87 remaining days, with him turning himself in on Sept. 22 at 5:30 p.m. The court also granted work release Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.
- Brandon Thomas pleaded guilty and was sentenced on the following charges: Driving on a DUI-suspended license, third offense (4 years to run consecutive with operating a motor vehicle under the influence of alcohol .08, fourth or greater offense (1 year), driving on a DUI-suspended license, third offense, aggravator (1 year).
