provided, Sandlin was born in Dayton, Ohio in 1954 before he moved to Aberdeen, Ohio, at one point attending Manchester High School.

He stated that he began his career in the Navy onboard the aircraft carrier USS Forrestal CVA-59, which was homeported in Norfolk, Va. He remained with the ship from January 1973 to September 1975. Afterward, he separated from active duty before reentering in January 1980.

He explained that he then attended two cryptologic schools to learn about codes, one in Pensacola, Fla. and the other in Winter Harbor, Maine. Afterward, he was given

cryptologic assignments from 1980 to 1999.

During this time, he also served onboard the USS Spruance DD-963 from March 1991 to February 1994 and participated in multiple Caribbean Sea operations and the Southwest Asia Ceasefire Campaign in support of **United Nations sanctions** against Iraq. Sandlin was Senior Enlisted Advisor and Operations Superintendent for the Directorate of Operations at a Department of Defense joint operating facility at NSGA Denver from 1997 until 1999, when he

retired from active duty. According to a 2022 article by The Ripley Bee, Sandlin was awarded the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Navy Commendation Medal and the Navy Achievement Medal with three gold stars for his service.

In his interview, he claimed that, at the time of his retirement, he was one of only 14 retired Master Chief Petty Officers (E-9) in the world.

Sandlin's outstanding military service and dedication to his community made him the perfect choice to lead the VFW's Veteran's Day Parade.

According to the VFW's website, the organization's mission is to "foster camaraderie among United States veterans of overseas conflicts. To serve our veterans, the military and our communities. To advocate on behalf of all veterans." Further, its vision is to "Ensure that veterans are respected for their service, always receive their earned entitlements, and are recognized for the sacrifices they and their loved ones have made on behalf of this great coun-

try." With over 1.4 million members nationwide, it does this by providing eligible veterans with ways to communicate and form connections between themselves and their community, as well as speaking up on behalf of veterans' legal rights and physical and mental health.

Sandlin stated that the Simon Kenton VFW Post #2734 was established in downtown Maysville in 1946 before it moved to the AA Highway in March 2013.

During the parade, local veterans ride in vehicles and trailers — some in their uniforms — so that the community may view them and honor them for their service to America.

In his interview, Sandlin stated that he will be wearing his uniform as he rides alongside his wife,

who he has been married to for 52 years, although he joked that he is no longer able to fit in the uni-

When asked how the community can support veterans outside of the parade, Sandlin responded that the VFW is accepting volunteers to help with activities, such as bingo. He added that many veterans' organizations are in need younger members,

"In ways of supporting veterans, I guess just reach out, just pay attention," he stated. "There's a lot of vets that fly under the radar. They don't get the help they need, they don't get the treatment they need."

expressing his belief that

that kind of connection is

necessary.

Sandlin noted that many veterans are in need of mental health resources.

"You know, depending on what they saw and what they experienced, especially the guys in Afghanistan and Iraq, you know, some of those guys come back and they're not the same guys. And it was the same in Vietnam," he expressed.

He then recommended donating to the Disabled American Veterans and the United Service Organizations.

Line-up for the Veteran's Day Parade will take place at 1 p.m. and the parade will begin at 2 p.m. The route will begin in downtown Maysville at the Rotary Club, travel up 2nd Street and turn onto Wall Street before heading back to the Rotary Club along 3rd Street.
