Bechtel Parsons Blue Grass builds new playground at **Betty Miller Park**

Bechtel Parsons Blue Grass, the joint venture responsible for disposing of the weapons at the Blue Grass Army Depot, has gifted a new playground to Richmond Parks and Recreation at Betty Miller Park.

Betty Miller Park is a three-acre tract of land that houses the Betty Miller Building, which in turn houses the Richmond Teen Center and the Richmond Summer Camp.

Betty Miller, who helped establish the New Liberty Homeless Shelter, served on the Human Rights Commission, started the Senior Citizen Feeding Program, and helped establish the first food bank in Richmond, inspired the names of the park and building. Miller died in 2022 at 88 years old.

The new playground was the result of a \$55,000 donation by Bechtel Parsons Blue Grass. The new playground features a slide, a jungle gym, and a swing set.

"We've tried to be good

ered the news during Tuesday's meeting of the Berea City Council, noting the Parks and Recreation Department is planning a number of

Glyndon Hotel revitalization moves forward

On Thursday, April 17 at noon, residents are invited to the City Hall Chambers for an exciting presentation regarding Phase II of the Glyndon Hotel feasibility study. This session marks a significant leap in the revitalization efforts for the historic hotel, which has been a cornerstone of the community since its inception in 1889.

The City issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) in April 2023 to find qualified consultants who could unlock the true potential for the Glyndon Hotel.

In June, the City Commission unanimously appointed City Visions, a Louisville-based firm renowned for transforming historically significant urban properties. Their impressive portfolio includes successful revitalization projects in cities such as Buffalo, Minneapolis, and Dayton, ensuring that their expertise will benefit the Glyndon project.

Following the encouraging findings presented in Phase I, the City Commission voted unanimously to proceed into Phase
