to 47-42 heading into the fourth quarter. Greenup, however, lost their spark as time ticked away. The Raiders' defense tightened, forcing turnovers and limiting Greenup's looks at the basket. Multiple key blocks from Colton McGuire (12) set the tone, and Grant Menix (10) gave East Carter its first lead of the night at 48-47 with 5:20 remaining in the game.

The final stretch kept

fans on edge with every possession. East Carter surged ahead 51-47, only for Greenup to claw back and briefly retake the lead at 52-51 with just 35 seconds left. That's when Burton delivered the play of the game, driving hard to the rim, blasting through contact, and finishing in the paint, also while getting fouled. U.S. Senate appears unlikely to pass bill to extend existing ACA tax credits

The U.S. Senate is expected to vote Thursday on a Democratic bill to extend the existing Affordable Care Act tax credits for three years, but multiple news sources say it is unlikely the bill will get enough votes to pass.

The enhanced health care subsidies created during the Covid-19 pandemic will expire at the end of the month unless Congress acts. And while people can still get tax credits, they will be reduced so premiums will

go up

At a Nov. 18 ThriveKY meeting, David Verry, assistant director with the state's Division of Health Plan Oversight, said without the enhanced tax credits, "The majority, 58% or so, are seeing an increase of \$100 or more per month, 10,000 Kentuckians are seeing an increase of \$500 or more per month, and some are seeing increases of over \$1,000 per month."

Dustin Pugel, policy director at the Kentucky Center for Economic Policy, puts it another way in an analysis of what

Kentuckians in every county will see if Congress doesn't act to extend the existing tax credits: "This lost support would harm Kentuckians in all 120 counties. For these households, premium costs are likely to double in many cases. A family of four with an income twice the poverty level would see their annual premiums rise from \$2,102 to \$5,361. A 60-year-old couple with a household income of \$85,000 would lose their insurance support entirely and see their annual premium costs rise from \$7,225

The analysis comes with an interactive map of how many Kentuckians used Kynect, Kentucky's health insurance marketplace, for their health insurance in every county in 2025.

The enhanced tax credits, or subsidies, were at the crux of the recent 43-day federal government shutdown.

communities to revitalize any property that is being underutilized," she explained.

Weedman said there were many different ways to approach the program, and the grant process they are working on now is to fund the assessment phase.

"If you are applying for a \$500,000 grant for assessment as we are," she said, "We are identifying sites that are not being used the best way."

The assessment grant, Weedman said, allows for the determination of what, if any environmental issues are present and how those issues can be remediated. The assessment funds do not pay for the actual remediation, which would require additional funding. The assessment grant, however, is open to any

property public or private, and requires property access authorization. It also requires the property owner to apply for that property to be in the Brown Field Program.
