Marsh was familiar with the program from her time as food service director in Hopkins County and was excited to bring it to Trigg County.

When primary Principal Lindsey Kinslow asked whether Marsh knew of anything that could help sate the kids' hunger in the afternoons, the food service director turned to the grant program.

Trigg County has received \$63,750 in grant funds to purchase the snacks for the district.

School officials noted that selection for the grant was based on applications that were submitted by elementary schools participating in the National School Lunch Program and who have at least 50% of their students that are eligible to receive free or reduced-price meals.

Marsh said the program is intended to make the snacks available at least three times a week.

"It is just basically

monies to provide a fruit or a vegetable snack. . . to promote that healthier eating," the director explained about the grant.

She said all kinds of fruits and vegetables are introduced through the program, including some like kiwi that may not be as familiar to the youngsters and sugar snap peas, the latter a vegetable high in fiber, Vitamin C and folate that the students were reluctant to try recently.

First-grader Everleigh Reynolds, 7, said she likes fruit and vegetables; her favorites are oranges and carrots, while classmate Alaina Bailey, also 7, prefers strawberries dipped in chocolate and carrots with ranch dressing.

Neither youngster likes cooked carrots.

But they do like having the snacks at school.

Being able to munch on something keeps Alaina from being hungry like she once was at the end of the day, the young girl notes.

Fifth-grader Clint Dossett said he tries to eat healthily, although he admitted that most of

his food choices are not all that healthy for him.

"Most of the time, it's probably candy," observes Addison Ezell of the choices that she and other youngsters are more likely to make.

The young girl, 10, explains that she likes grapes but doesn't really eat a lot of vegetables.

Clint likes cauliflower and broccoli as well as oranges and apples, the fruits being ones that Marsh observes are popular among all grades.

Clint says he eats fruits and vegetables once or twice a day, and he likes the new snack program that is available in Trigg County.

"After lunch, when you go to school and you have all this other stuff, most of the kids get hungry," the young boy says, noting the snacks are healthy and liked by most of the students.

Kindergarten teacher Jayse York points out that the youngsters last year either brought their own snacks to school or didn't get to have one.

Now everyone has a snack.

"The kids really enjoy

it, especially those who don't get to try a lot of things at home," she notes of the program. "It's something new for them, and we always encourage them to try it."

She adds that it offers an extra opportunity besides breakfast and lunch for them to eat.

York says grapes, the fresh bagged apple slices, watermelon and green peppers have been a hit among her young kindergartners.

Youngsters in Trigg County get a snack every afternoon, either a fruit or a vegetable; the snacks are brought to the schools and placed on food carts in the primary and intermediate hallways.

The food service director also provides information about the fruits and vegetables to teachers, and the teachers are asked to talk about the snacks while the youth are eating.

Marsh said an important aspect of the program lies in being able to introduce the youth to the fruits and vegetables that are featured.

She loves having the teachers and staff

enjoy the snacks as well because that models good behavior for the kids, the director notes.

"We want to get them early to get those healthy eating habits established," she

observes of the young students.

He noted that the hospital has generated \$125,000 in real money in one month since the cardiac clinic opened, compared to \$50,000 that was generated the same month last year.

"In both months, July and August both have been really, really good," the CEO said of 2024.

The hospital board also last week heard from Chief Financial Officer Don Michael, who noted that the hospital had 20 admissions and 213 patient days in August, with 417 patients seen in the hospital's emergency room the same month.

"Our outpatient volumes were up in almost every department from last year," Michael told the board of increases in the emergency room, surgery, lab, x-ray and therapy departments.

He said cash remains strong, with 45 accounts receivable days that Michael said reflect a slight increase from last month.

He added that revenues for August were \$5,523,181, or 14% more than last year.

"Revenues were up significantly in surgery, lab and radiology," he said, noting that expenses were 5% more than last year at \$2,177,429.

Net income was \$338,694, or 55% more than last year, while net income for the year-to-date was \$2,339,471, Michael reported to the board.

The finance officer further revealed that five bids were received for an ultrasound machine for the hospital, with the board giving a nod of approval to a \$98,130 bid from GE HealthCare.

Michael said GE HealthCare is actually the unit that Dr. Sanjay Bose, the new clinic's cardiology specialist, recommends and likes the most "because he's used to it and the quality of the images," he explained to board members.

The GE bid was not the lowest or highest among the five offers, which ranged from \$75,000 to \$109,900, for

an ultrasound unit.

IN OTHER BUSINESS

The board approved initial appointments for Kevin Richardson, a doctor of osteopathic medicine in emergency/hospital medicine, and for Dr. Robert Brooks, in diagnostic radiology.

• Sumner said the helipad was painted recently and "looks a lot better," the hospital CEO said.

• He said the large heating, ventilation and air conditioning unit for the medical surgery and emergency room area was to be moved in beginning Oct. 2 through the next two weeks.

• Additionally, Sumner said the project for Trigg County Primary Care will be tabled right now.

• Officials said all four as-needed positions for paramedic openings have been filled, with three of those individuals going to school to become paramedics. No one has accepted the \$10,000 paramedic sign-on bonus that has been offered.

• Sumner said the hospital is losing one mobile magnetic resonance imaging unit and will be renting another MRI unit to use until a permanent machine arrives at the local facility.

• He also said a new conference and training room at the hospital is moving along well and likely will be finished at the end of November.

TRIGG FISCAL COURT ORDINANCE NO.: 2024-03

AN ORDINANCE relating to the annual tax levy.

WHEREAS, the assessment for 2024 ad valorem taxes upon property in Trigg County has been certified as follows:

WHEREAS, the 2024 compensating tax rate for county taxes in Trigg County has been certified to be 7.90 cents per \$100 valuation of property subject to full county rates; and

WHEREAS, a County Budget for Fiscal Year 2024-2025 has been duly adopted, which budget provides for gross estimated receipts from tax levies amounting to \$14,045,787 and the following tax levies for county taxes are estimated to produce that amount of gross tax revenue;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE FISCAL COURT OF THE COUNTY OF TRIGG, COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY:

SECTION ONE: There is levied for the year 2024 an ad valorem tax per \$100.00 of assessed valuation on all real estate, tangible personal and public service company property subject to county tax to provide revenue for general purposes and the maintenance of roads and bridges, and such additional tax for each Special District as indicated, at the rates set out below for each to-wit:
