
was driving during the discussion, testifying behind the wheel at times while he was shown on screen in the courtroom.

Jesse Mudd, Matt Bevin's attorney, argued he's been in communication with Jonah Bevin's lawyers, after the judge said she would have been willing to be lenient if he'd presented proof he was working to "rectify the situation" within the time constraints.

"But he didn't do that," Johnson said. "So I have no choice but to find that you are in contempt of court for violating this court's order. You didn't do what you were supposed to do when you were supposed to do it, and you were aware of what it was that you were supposed to do."

John Helmers and Melina Hettiaratchi, two Louisville-based lawyers representing Jonah Bevin, said financial documents they still need from their client's adoptive father include his most recent state and income tax returns, along with bank account statements and other financial disclosures. During the hearing, the lawyers suggested Matt Bevin should be fined up to \$21,000.

"The goal is we just need to be able to have these to be able to also negotiate in good faith," Hettiaratchi told reporters afterward, noting they're still open to

settling the case without a public hearing. "... We can't even advise our client on how to negotiate without these documents."

Glenna Bevin, the former governor's ex-wife, is a party in the case, but her adoptive son's attorneys did not seek to hold her in contempt, as Helmers said she

had not done anything to "directly impact our ability to move forward with the case."

Glenna Bevin filed for divorce in 2023, saying her marriage with Matt Bevin was "irretrievably broken." The divorce was finalized in 2025, but Jonah Bevin moved to intervene in the case last spring.

Now 19, Jonah Bevin has argued he's owed retroactive child support for years he spent at boarding schools during his teenage years — including Atlantis Leadership Academy in Jamaica, which was raided by local law enforcement in 2024 while he was in its custody on allegations teens at the camp were being abused.

Jonah Bevin's adoptive parents did not go to the country to attend a court hearing to regain custody of the then-17-year-old boy.

At issue in the fight for child support is the diploma he received from a Florida boarding school, which his attorneys have said may not be legitimate.

Jonah Bevin is one of four Ethiopia natives the Bevins adopted in 2012, ahead of Matt Bevin's run for governor. He won the office in 2015 after campaigning on a platform that included revamping the state's foster care system and served four years before losing to current Gov. Andy Beshear in the 2019 election. Jonah Bevin has said he was first sent to a boarding school for "troubled teens" in 2020 and has added he believes he was adopted to help his adoptive father's public image.

fuse to let their phone be searched, according to an ACLU Know Your Rights Guide.

ICE agents do not have unlimited authority to detain or question U.S. citizens without cause.

The Constitution's Fourth Amendment protects against unreasonable searches and seizures, meaning that prolonged detention or invasive questioning typically requires reasonable suspicion or probable cause. Travelers' rights are weakened within 100 miles of U.S. borders, subjecting anyone to a warrantless search to a certain extent.

Past incidents have raised concerns about overreach, including cases in which immigration authorities mistakenly detained U.S. citizens.

What are residents' and noncitizens' rights at US airports?

Lawful permanent residents and visa holders also have significant rights at airports, though their situation is more complex. They are generally required to answer questions related to their immigration status when entering the United States, but they still retain due process protections under the Fifth Amendment.

Noncitizens, particularly those without legal status, may face broader questioning from ICE, but they still have key rights: the right to remain silent, the right to refuse consent to searches of personal belongings in some circumstances, and the right to request an attorney if detained.

Having an attorney's contact on standby — preferably on an easily accessible piece of paper — could be useful if passengers feel their rights are being violated.

Requesting to call an attorney depends on the situation, including cases of prolonged detention, Noor Zafar, senior staff attorney at the American Civil Liberties Union's Immigrants' Rights Project, previously told USA TODAY. Travelers should keep in mind that officers have the authority to deny the request.

Legal challenges dating back to earlier Trump-era immigration orders have underscored that even non-

citizens at airports cannot be denied basic legal protections, such as access to counsel and protection from unlawful detention.

Civil rights advocates caution that the presence of ICE agents in airports may blur the line between routine security screening and immigration enforcement. While ICE has authority under federal law to make immigration arrests, that authority is not unlimited and must still comply with constitutional safeguards.

As the shutdown continues and ICE deployment begins, travelers could be entering an uncertain legal landscape.
