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extended their lead. The fourth quarter likewise saw the Lady Braves struggle to counter the momentum.

Making only six field goals in the game, Grant was defeated 53-28 in the tournament opener. Free throws and turnovers cost the Lady Braves as they only made 15 of their 28 shots at the line.

Grant also had over 15 turnovers, with the Bobcats tearing away chances to score. Having only knocked down scarce field goals and having lost double-digit possessions, Grant was bested by Central's pressure on the defense and attack.

Olivia Ginn and Madison Utter were the top scorers for the Lady Braves with 12 and 6 points respectively.

GRANT COUNTY VS. LESLIE COUNTY, KENTUCKY

During the Lady Braves' second game against Leslie County, turnovers continued to plague Grant. Akin to their game against the Bobcats, the Lady Braves initially fended off the Eagles throughout the first half.

Going back and forth, Grant repeatedly

nearly overtook Leslie on brief runs. Ginn, Myla Rose, and Keightley Ray led the Lady Braves in the first half with 11 from Ginn while Rose and Ray each scored five points.

Progressing into the third quarter the Lady Braves took off early with Ginn, Ella Miller, Utter, and Moriah Wills all scoring at the rim. However, Grant's transition offense was countered by a three-pointer and four free throws from the Eagles.

Shortly afterwards Leslie County's offense took flight with minutes left in the quarter. Over the remaining three minutes, the four-point difference grew into a score of 55-38.

Things only worsened in the fourth as the Eagles managed to enforce their position to a 26-point win. Once fouls began to pile up against the Lady Braves they began to lose players and Leslie County earned bonus points from the line.

By the conclusion of the fourth the Lady Braves sat behind at 71-45. Macie Fox earned six during the second half for Grant while Ginn was the leading scorer with 15 overall.

GRANT COUNTY VS. KNOTT COUNTY CENTRAL

Unlike the previous two games, the Lady Braves kicked off the third contest by taking the lead early. In a showdown against the Lady Patriots, Grant was ultimately victorious.

Building on 16 points from Ginn the Lady Braves took a 20-7 lead at the end of the first quarter. With Grant shutting down Knott Central's forwards along with Ginn leading the offense the game opened strong.

Throughout the second quarter, Knott Central was unable to slow the Lady Braves' attack as they faltered. Only allowing two points in the second, Grant ended the first half ahead 31-9. Converting several steals on defense alongside a downhill offense the Lady Braves pulled away from the Patriots.

Despite the 22-point difference Knott Central was not defeated quite yet. After jump shots from Wills and Utter, the Patriots revolted against Grant. Consecutive three-pointers alongside fastbreaks cut into the Lady Braves' lead. In just two minutes, turnovers and great shooting enabled Knott Central to go on a 13-point run.

Though the Lady Braves recovered near the end of the quarter with threes from Ray and layups by Rose their lead was cut in half.

Grant forced Knott Central back in the final quarter, however, as they stopped the bleed. Slowing the game down the Lady Braves defended their lead regardless of the Patriots' efforts. With Ray, Miller, Fox, and Ginn all scoring for Grant they secured a 54-40 win.

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BRAVES VS. EASTSIDE EAGLES (GEORGIA)

The Braves' second game, against the Eastside Eagles, saw a similar result.

Off the back of a great first quarter, Grant faltered during the second, and the game fell apart. Opening the game, the Braves combated an aggressive full-court trap from the Eagles. This did cause some issues, but a great defensive battle from Grant limited East in scoring. Heading into the second quarter, the Braves trailed at 13-11 with Wagner, Blake, Flamini, and Hamm all scoring.

However, the Eagles adapted to Grant's zone defense early in the second while also changing their press. Shifting into a 2-1-2 zone and utilizing their size advantage, East began to rapidly extend their position. Having earned two free throws from Hamm, the Braves ended the half behind by 14 points.

Grant was not able to adapt to the Eagles' press during the second half, with very limited scoring opportunities. After an initial back-and-forth on defense from both teams, East continued its attack.

Over the course of the third and fourth quarters, the Braves were outscored 18-37. Shooting, along with turnovers, enabled this drastic difference in scoring. Grant only made 11% of their three-point attempts and 27% overall field goal shots throughout the game.

Working to catch up, a rally from Grant only allowed a five-point difference by the end of the half. With both teams going quickly on the attack the Braves proved much more effective at breaking the Bears' full-court press.

Sadly for the Braves they would find themselves trying to come back for the remainder of the game. At the start of the third, Grant went on another run. Thanks to post-ups from Beach and Wagner the Braves trailed 40-39.

Bluff wouldn't lose the lead easily, though, with duel threes moments later. The momentum then traded hands as both teams went on runs.

Nearing the end of the game the Braves clawed closer. Going from down nine Grant drew within one point of the Bears' lead on the back of an and-one from Beach and a layup from Hammonds.

Unfortunately in the final minute, Bluff defended their lead with a floater and three giving them some distance. Attempting to converse time, Grant began to foul but the Bears completed at the free throw line in the bonus. Ending the tournament with their fifth straight loss Grant was defeated 59-52.

BRAVES VS. CHEROKEE BLUFF (GEORGIA)

Following this rough loss, the Braves were just beaten by Cherokee Bluff. Nearly pulling off a comeback performance, Grant lost to the Bears 59-52.

Hamm and Beach were Grant's main scorers with 20 and 12 from these Braves. In the meantime, Wagner, Blake, and Beach were the leading rebounders with 12, 8, and 7.

The third and final game of the tournament opened with both teams showcasing a fast-paced offense. While Bluff worked to the rim the Braves built their attack off the dribble and from deep.

Combining three three-pointers from Hamm alongside layups by Beach, Trent, and Braylen the Braves kept pace. Heading into the second quarter the score was 20-17 as five turnovers allowed a slight edge to the Bears.

In the second quarter, Bluff went on a run with five minutes to go as they took a nine-point advantage. This was short-lived, though, as six points from Hammonds cut into the difference.
