managed care organizations, and state officials, in addition to reviewing research and available data.

According to the findings, Medicaid enrollment has grown from roughly one-fifth to one-third of Kentuckians in recent years, while overall spending has more than doubled without measurable gains in health outcomes. Board members also cited significant federal policy changes that will impact how states operate Medicaid in the coming years.

Key concerns and recommendations include:

- Outdated administrative processes — The board called for modernized eligibility systems, improved data checks, and simplification of overlapping programs to reduce delays and provider burden.

- Compliance with federal work requirements — Federal rules now expect certain adult Medicaid beneficiaries to meet

work or community engagement standards. Kentucky’s current system does not align with those expectations. The board recommended establishing clear criteria and support networks for workforce participation, while protecting beneficiaries who cannot work.

- Rising program costs — With Medicaid growth becoming increasingly expensive for the state budget, recommendations include additional cost-containment measures, regular audits, and review of duplicative or non-essential services.

- X• Impact of federal tax and payment reforms on providers — Upcoming federal changes will affect provider taxes and Medicaid payment programs. The board argued for a state plan to prevent disruptions in healthcare services.

- Lack of transparency — Lawmakers and the public “do not have a clear picture” of how Medicaid dollars are spent, the report states. Recommendations

include improved data access for oversight agencies and a public dashboard displaying costs, outcomes, and performance metrics.

- Inaccurate provider listings — Some providers are shown as accepting Medicaid patients despite not doing so. The board urged stricter reporting requirements, enforcement for inaccurate information, and review of provider rates, particularly in rural areas and dental care.

- Limited improvements in health outcomes — Despite growing spending, Kentucky is not seeing proportional gains in population health. Suggestions include strengthening managed care contracts, exploring new care delivery models, and improving transportation services for beneficiaries.

- Inconsistent oversight — The report recommends unified oversight structures, real-time data, standardized performance dashboards, routine

audits, and enforceable penalties for underperformance.

- Fragmented behavioral health services — The board supports transitioning to a statewide Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic model to better integrate mental health, addiction, and physical healthcare services.

In summary, the board concluded that Kentucky’s Medicaid program “is too complex, too expensive, and not delivering expected results,” and that modernization, transparency, oversight, and alignment with federal changes are needed.

With the 2026 legislative session underway, the findings are expected to help inform Medicaid-related policy and budget decisions. Medicaid currently covers about one-third of Kentuckians and represents the state’s second-largest budget expense.

At the time of the sale, the successful bidder shall either pay full cash or make a deposit of 10% of the purchase price with the balance on a credit for 30 days. In the event the successful bidder desires or elects to credit the balance, he or she will be required to post bond and furnish an acceptable surety thereon. The down payment, in addition to either a letter of credit or acceptable surety, must be produced at the time of the sale. (The necessary surety form can be obtained at the Special Master Commissioner’s office.) Said bond and/or letter of credit shall be for the unpaid purchase price and bear interest at the judgment rate from the date of sale until paid. The Surety **MUST BE PRE-APPROVED** by the Special Master Commissioner’s office no later than 12:00 noon on the Friday immediately preceding the sale date to secure the unpaid balance of the purchase price. In the event the successful bidder is the plaintiff, then in lieu of the deposit the plaintiff shall be allowed to bid on credit up to the judgment amount.

The purchaser will be responsible for taxes for the year of the sale. The Special Master Commissioner will make a good faith effort to obtain and pay all taxes or assessments upon the property for prior years; however, this cannot be guaranteed.

The purchaser may take possession of the property pursuant to the terms of the judgment. If the judgment does not make provision for possession, the purchaser may seek possession of the property through the court system after payment of the full purchase price. The Special Master Commissioner does not have ability to grant access to or possession of the property, and therefore makes no representation or warranty of any kind as to the conditions of the property.

The Special Master Commissioner does not obtain a title search or investigate for further liens on the property. The purchaser is responsible for title searches and/or any additional liens not named in the Judgment and Order of Sale and for the results of any good and accurate survey of the property. The Plaintiff, the Court, and the Commissioner shall not be deemed to have warranted title to any purchaser. The property is sold subject to the Judgment and Order of Sale in each case which should be reviewed carefully prior to purchase.
