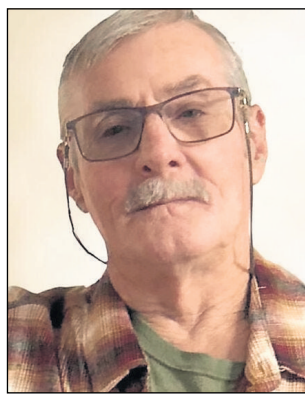


OBITUARY

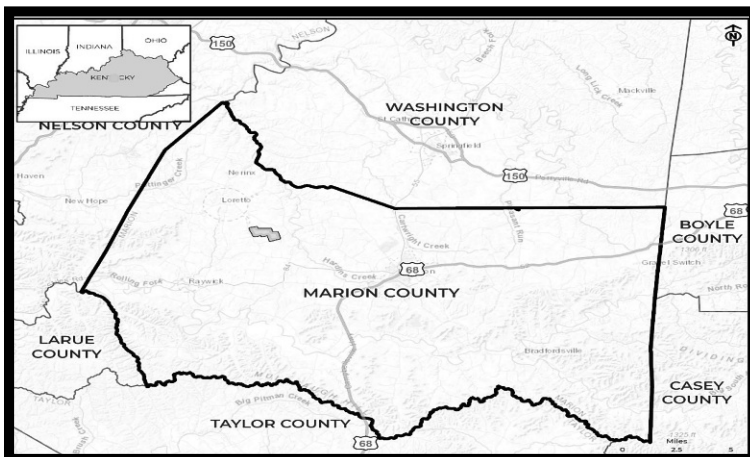

CRAB RUN SOLAR PROJECT Notice of Application

On December 19, 2025, Crab Run Solar Project, LLC ("Crab Run") filed an application with the Kentucky State Board on Electric Generation and Transmission Siting ("Siting Board") in Case No. 2025-00276. Crab Run is proposing to develop and construct an up to 45-megawatt alternating current merchant solar electric generating facility on approximately 400 acres of land in Marion County, Kentucky. The proposed project will consist of approximately 110,052 photovoltaic solar panels and associated racking, approximately 12 inverters, a project substation transformer, and other necessary equipment to support the project. A map of the project area is provided below:



Crab Run's application is subject to the Siting Board's review and approval. The contact information for the Siting Board is as follows: P.O. Box 615, 211 Sower Boulevard, Frankfort, Kentucky 40602-0615, or by telephone at (502) 564-3940. A person who wishes to become a party to this proceeding before the board may, by written motion filed no later than thirty (30) days after the publication date hereof, request leave to intervene. An evidentiary hearing has been scheduled for April 28, 2026 at the offices of the Public Service Commission, 211 Sower Boulevard, Frankfort, Kentucky. A request for a local public hearing or local public information meeting shall be made by at least three (3) interested persons who reside in the county or municipal corporation in which the proposed project is to be located. The request shall be made in writing and shall be filed within thirty (30) days following the publication date hereof.

Previously the grant required a 50% match, but that has been lowered to only 15% with this grant. Leep is also applying for additional money from the program and is awaiting a response.

Rebecca Williams, Emergency Management Director, addressed the court requesting that installation of outdoor sirens be considered when developing the 2026-27 budget. Williams talked about the need for sirens to alert people who are outside and may not receive a warning

through a cell phone of weather alert radio. She stated she is looking for outside funding and has talked with community members about helping offset the costs. She also noted she has spoken with the Loretto City Council and has asked to speak to the Lebanon City Council at the next meeting seeking support and funding for the sirens.

The cost per siren is just over \$36,000. With a lifespan of 40 to 60 years, Williams said that breaks down to \$916 per year if you only get 40 years of service from the siren.

The next meeting of the Marion County Fiscal Court will be Thursday, March 5, at 4 p.m.

properly licensed and pay the necessary fees. This legislation also holds insurers accountable for the actions of their agents, rather than allowing individuals to bear the sole responsibility. It also gives the Insurance Commissioner more authority to inspect records, investigate complaints, deny and revoke licenses, and shut down bad actors. HB 527 also requires insurers to offer a fortified roof upgrade rider for Kentucky homeowners, with non-fortified single-family dwellings, when a roof replacement claim happens. This measure requires banks to inform customers

of the risks and explain the insurance purchased through a bank is not insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. It also ensures that banks cannot pressure individuals to buy insurance to get a loan and that banks keep insurance records separate. This legislation also further clarifies broad insurance categories such as inland marine insurance, which establishes what kinds of property and shipments can be insured.

"This bill is about accountability," Pollock added. "HB 527 modernizes our insurance statutes and makes it clear that if you do business in Kentucky, you must follow the rules and be properly licensed."
