Fiscal Court Approves New Sheriff's Department Recording System

Court also discusses Jerusalem Ridge Festival sponsorships, signs two proclamations

On Sept. 8, the Ohio County Fiscal Court met to sign two proclamations, discuss sponsoring the Jerusalem Ridge Festival and replace a communication monitoring system for the Ohio County Sheriff's Department.

Ohio County Judge-Executive David Johnston signed a proclamation presented by the Childhood Cancer Awareness Society designating September as Childhood Cancer Awareness Month.

A second proclamation, presented by representatives of Dogwood Estates in Beaver Dam, recognized Sept. 13-19 as National Assisted Living Week. This year's theme, "Shining Through the Years," recognizes the role assisted living communities play in supporting residents, families and communities.

Later, Dennis Cook, chairman of the Bill Monroe Foundation, spoke about sponsorships for the Sept. 10-13 Jerusalem Ridge Festival.

Cook said ticket sales had doubled compared to last year, but sponsorships had fallen.

Bands for the four-day festival cost \$50,400.

"This is for Ohio County. It's not just bluegrass people," Cook said.

Johnston said he had contributed \$4,000 in discretionary funds. District 5 Magistrate Larry Morphew pledged \$200, while District 1 Magistrate Michael McKenney, District 2 Magistrate Jason Bullock and District 4 Magistrate Dale Beavin each pledged \$500.

After returning from a closed session to discuss legal matters, Johnston called Ohio County Sheriff Adam Wright to discuss replacing a server at the Sheriff's Department Dispatch Center.

The dispatch center used a Revcord system to monitor and record radio traffic and 911 and non-emergency calls.

"Unfortunately, this server went down, and we were unaware that it had been down for quite some time until we went back to try to gather information regarding one of our cases," Wright said.

After Revcord was unable to remotely access the system, it was shipped to Texas. When it was returned, Wright said the department discovered its saved

information had been wiped clean and the server crashed again.

The department then contacted Replay Systems. Representatives drove from Nashville to examine the server and were able to get crucial parts operating. The company also offered a free 30-day trial.

Switching to Replay Systems will cost \$24,000, with an annual cost of \$5,400, about \$1,700 more than Revcord. Wright said the expense has already been budgeted.

"The one good thing about this system is they're close to home.

If it goes down, they'll come up, and they'll be here within a couple of hours," Wright said.

To help offset the cost, Wright proposed surplusing a 1987 AM General Humvee that has been in the department's possession since the early 2010s.

McKenney made a motion to use emergency reserve funds to cover the cost of switching to Replay Systems and authorize Wright to surplus the Humvee to reimburse a portion of those funds. Beavin seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.
