The Weight of Glory

The Corinthian church was a challenging one for the Apostle Paul. His letters to them reveal a church marked by conflict, sin, rivalries, a lack of discipline, and confusion.

Paul started the church on his second missionary journey. Corinth was the Roman capital of Greece. It was a wealthy and affluent city. There was a heavy pagan influence with worship to idols, and sexual immorality was accepted. The church began with Jewish Christians but grew to include a large Gentile audience. Paul served and taught them for a year and a half. Priscilla and Aquila hosted him. Like Paul, they were tentmakers and faithful to Christ.

Paul wrote two letters to the church while on his third missionary journey in Ephesus and Macedonia. He wrote to address the conflict and confusion. He dealt with sound doctrine, church discipline, immorality, and unity in the body of Christ. He pointed out the differences between a faith community built on Jesus Christ, and one under the influence of pagan practices. In the fourth chapter of 2 Corinthians, he writes:

“So we do not lose heart. Though our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen. For the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal.” (2 Corinthians 4:16-18)

Paul and his companions knew all about afflictions, trials, and troubles. They had suffered a great deal for the sake of preaching the Gospel. He wanted them to know that this world’s trouble and suffering were minor in comparison with the

future glory of God. It’s hard to think about the promises of God when we are knee-deep in the mud of this world. Unless you are four-wheeling or feeding farm animals, mud is not fun. It’s messy and bogs us down. It sticks to the body. So do pain, grief, and problems. They weigh you down, which is why hope is critical.

King David endured suffering and hard times. However, his hope in God was greater. He put it this way in the 30th Psalm:

“For his anger is but for a moment, and his favor is for a lifetime. Weeping may tarry for the night, but joy comes with the morning. (Ps. 30:5)

This “eternal weight of glory,” Paul describes to the Corinthians is about a focused hope in Jesus Christ. Paul knew that no matter what can happen in these “earth suits,” nothing compares to our future glory in God through Jesus Christ. This is a forward-thinking attitude. The kind that says, “Yeah, I’m covered in mud right now, but I’m going to be washed of it all by God’s grace.”

We all get covered in the mud of life. For some it’s the loss of a child, cancer, losing a job, divorce, addiction, poverty, or injustice. No human is immune to life’s junk. Think about that in your current situation. You aren’t alone! Every person is carrying something. I can’t imagine what it must be like to be covered in the mud of life without faith.

It may seem like forever, but the Bible, and people wiser than me, tell me that faith in Christ is forever. And that God’s future glory in Christ will endure way beyond the mud in which we are currently covered. This is the hope of God who never fails, leaves, or forsakes the apple of His eye, you and me!

Jimmy Wallace

Jimmy Carroll Wallace, 88, of Sturgis, Kentucky, passed away peacefully on Wednesday, September 9, 2026, at St. Vincent Hospice Care in Evansville, Indiana.



Jimmy was a lifelong resident of Sturgis, with the exception of three years spent in Jacksonville, Florida, where he began his teaching career. Raised in the Baptist faith, he was the son of the late Bill and Ella Wallace.

He attended public schools in Sturgis before earning a master’s degree in Industrial Education from Murray State University. Jimmy dedicated 27 years to education as a teacher at Union County High School, followed by 15 years serving as the school’s maintenance supervisor.

Jimmy will be remembered for his dedication to education, his entrepreneurial spirit, his service to the community, and his commitment to helping others.

He is preceded in death by his parents and his wife 67 years, Patsy Wallace.

Survivors include three daughters, Vickie Wallace of Sturgis, Lisa (Chris) Corbett of Louisville, Kentucky, and Stacey (Greg) Fuesler of Sturgis; grandsons, Tyler Fuesler of Sturgis and Alex Corbett of Lexington, Kentucky; a sister, Diane Wallace of Sturgis; a nephew, Todd (Cory) Simms of Clarksville, Tennessee; and special family friends, John Belt of Sturgis and Mark Applin of Henderson, Kentucky.
