Tyree finishes two tight ones on the road—Bears dominate Trinity at home

The Butler County Bears came in to last week losing three straight; however, Coach Bo West and his young team turned three straight into wins in order to get back to .500 baseball before getting district opponent Grayson County on back-toback nights to start this week's ball. Thursday and Friday, the Bears will finish the week with Hopkins County Central and Todd County Central at

Opening last week on the road at Whitesville, the Bears were propelled by a five-run second to cling to a 6-5 win over the Trinity Raiders, who got two in the first and tried to rally late in the contest. Duncan Tyree came on in relief to save the game, 6-5, getting the final two outs in the bottom of the seventh. The junior pitcher struck out a batter and tagged out the final Raider baserunner, who was trying to steal home for the potential

Senior pitcher, Malacki Murphy earned the win for the Bears, his third of the season. The southpaw went six-plus before turning it over to Tyree. He struck out four and walked four while sprinkling seven hits throughout. Of the five runs scored against Murphy, none of them were earned. The Bears had four costly errors in the game.

Leading off, Embry collected three of those walks and scored each time. Castlen, Brycen Mode, and Garrett Phelps all drove in two apiece. The Bears got doubles from Mode, Murphy, Colt Akers, and two by Phelps. Phelps also dominated on the bump; he went the five innings giving up only two singles while fanning four. He did walk one and hit a couple in the 12-0 shutout of the Trinity Raiders.

Friday, at Metcalfe County to end the busy week, Castlen, Phelps, and Tyree all singled in the opening inning. The Hornets made a costly error in the first that allowed two runs for the visiting Bears. Mode and Murphy picked right back up in the top of the second by driving in runs as the Bears took an early, 4-0 advantage.

Castlen was cruising, retiring five of the first six he faced, three via strikeout. But after the Hornets scored one, they worked some counts and drew a couple more walks, before a single to center scored two more runs. After a miscue on the single, Phelps hit cutoff man, Embry, who tried a throw out a runner at home, but Mode finally fired to third where Will Amos applied the tag to retire the third out.

Tyree, who leads the Bears with 1.21 ERA and 1.04 WHIP, got the call to relieve

Castlen in the bottom of the third. Tyree had 1-2-3 innings except the fourth and seventh innings. He would give up two one-out singles in the fourth before whiffing the second and third outs with runners stranded at first and second.

Butler County got an insurance-run in the top of the sixth; Phelps singled home Mode, who stole second after reaching on an error on a tough ball hit to third. It was very much needed. The leadoff batter in the seventh, doubled to right and moved to third on a ground out. He scored on a passed ball to make it 5-4, but Tyree bowed his neck and finished off the last two Hornets by strikeouts, again.

Tyree's impressive five innings only took him 62 pitches, 45 of which were strikes. He sent eight Hornets packing back to the dugout and did not walk a batter. Tyree also had a single and a double at the plate along with Phelps, who also enjoyed a two-hit night. Phelps, Mode, Akers, Castlen, and Embry all swiped bags,

They came out victorious over the Lady Cats in a 7-6, third versus fourth region affair.
