THE WAY WE WERE

60 YEARS AGO MAY 6, 1965

Anderson County's desegregation plan for 1965 to 1966 was one of eight Kentucky school districts plans which were disapproved because they failed to meet new federal regulations making them eligible to receive federal aid. The other systems are Glasgow, Mayfield, Shelbyville and county systems of Cumberland, Green, Logan, and Todd. Anderson county, along with all other seven districts, had submitted plans for the next school year that were in accord with regulations issued in January by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, according to superintendent Andrew bird. but new guidelines were adopted Wednesday night of last week and were released in Washington DC last Thursday. Anderson County's New Plan called for the enrollment of 26 black students in three districts, formerly all with white students, sand spring, Alton and Saffell Street elementary, however, this plan has been disapproved and an interpretation of the rejection has not been received, superintendent Bird said today. He said the State Department of Education had advised him they're making an inquiry of the Federal Department of Health, Education and Welfare as to why Anderson County's plan was disapproved and the state officials will notify the local Board of Education on further information obtained. The state officials will be working with the local board and setting up and working out a plan that will be in compliance

with the federal act. superintendent Bird said.

Two Frankfort youths were caught in Anderson County early in the morning and a third escaped following a break-in at the Robert Cammack service station on North Main Street. The two that were caught were released from the La Grange Reformatory just 19 days ago on April 17 after serving a term on storehouse breaking. William Mills, 21 and Charles Peffer, 20, are charged in Anderson County with Storehouse breaking and are in the local jail in

default of \$1500 Bond each. Their examination trial has been set for Monday morning.

The Lawrenceburg City Council, in a lengthy session Monday night, accepted a proposal to assist the citizens of Woodland Park Subdivision in the Furnishing of sanitary sewer service. They passed an ordinance relating to the annexation of all the subdivisions that has not already been or is in the process of being annexed. They also made a decision on the proposed Edition to the city's sewage treatment

plant enrolled on other City business. two members of the citizens committee representing the Woodland Park subdivision presented a proposal from approximately 80 percent of the resident property owners of the city to assist in furnishing sewer service by paying on a contemplated sewer project, including lift station and force main, a total sum of \$19,000, with the balance of the project being financed through sewer assessment bonds based on the assessed valuation of each law in the subdivision following required annexation of the area.

40 YEARS AGO MAY 2, 1985

Anderson County's first major scare due to not having any countywide zoning regulations still has officials wondering what to do next. At least a month ago, and probably longer, some officials became aware that a Franklin County developer was planning a major housing development in the Anderson and Franklin county area. At the April 12 meeting of a fiscal court, magistrates were told by Tom Jones, local attorney, that the development would likely include 340 mobile home units, 300 of which would be on KY 151 in Anderson County. from that date until last Friday's regular Court meeting, nothing was apparently done by local officials to gather more information on the projects as nothing new was reported. At some point, magistrate Stewart Gritton, a candidate for County judge executive, directed County attorney Dale Wright to draft a resolution requesting a public

hearing on the proposed development. When to have the hearing became the subject of a short but he did discuss.

By the end of May, Anderson will be the cleanest County in Kentucky and clubs at Anderson and Western schools will have plenty of money. The Beautify in 85 campaign sponsored by Anderson County Chamber of Commerce was kicked off Tuesdav when members of the 4-H teen club picked up litter at Lawrenceburg fairgrounds. The rest of this month, teenagers from Anderson and Western can bring in money for their favorite club by picking up litter along long roadsides. sponsors will pay \$7 per mile of road cleaned and adult volunteers will supervise the work, according to Sandy Pegs, one of the coordinators. According to Pegs, a list of all roads in the county will be posted at both high schools and students may choose any road or section of road to work

on. The goal of the campaign is to clean litter from every road sign in Anderson county, with the exception of those within the city limits.

Raises or the lack of them, will likely be a main subject of conversation around Anderson County Courthouse this week. A committee consisting of Jim Catlett, County judge executive, and magistrates Ralph Dennis and Ron Madden was to have their seller recommendations for certain County Employees completed by May 1. A special meeting of Fiscal Court has been set for Monday, May 6, for the entire court to hear the salary recommendations. They said Friday that has been sought from supervisors of various departments. salaries involved are those of Jailer and her deputies, Deputy clerks and magistrates. salaries of such office holders as the county judge, sheriff and county clerk are set by state law.




