THE WAY WE WERE

60 YEARS AGO May 13, 1965

Anderson High School girls track and field team took first place honors at the meet held last Saturday at the Kentucky State College Alumni field and nosed out Franklin County highs girls team by score of 71 to 56. They have gone into a rigid training program this week and are making preparations to win their second consecutive State title in Lexington on May 20, coach Charlie Groat said. Anderson qualified Saturday in 13 out of 15 events for the state meet. This is the largest number ever to qualify for my local team and it is believed they have a good chance to take their second state championship home. For their daily practice for the state meet the girls are running two 660 yard runs, two 440 runs, four 220 runs, ten 110 yard dashes and 25 starts of 30 yards. Their practice. daily is for 2 hours with no rest periods in between events. Last Saturday Charlene Peyton took individual scoring honors by winning three events for a total of 15 points for her team. Alberta Boler placed first in the 50 yard dash and second in the 220 yard dash. Betty Jameson was 4th in the 50-yard dash for Anderson, and second in the 75 yard dash. and the hundred yard dash Kathy Johnson placed second and Monard Johnson was third. In the 440 yard run Betty Jean Sims was

second and Peyton was third. Robert Blanton, 18, son of Mr and Mrs Matt Blanton of Warrensburg, has been chosen as the first selectee from the Anderson, Woodford, Shelby, Owen, Henry, and Franklin County District in the new Job Corps training program, Pat McCormick of the Department of Economic security, division of employment service said today. Blanton will go to the Tongue Point Job Corps Center at Astoria, Oregon, he has been informed. McCormick said Blanton is the first chosen of the 25 selectees that are being sought by The Job Corps for basic education, skill training and work experience. from 40 to 60 applications have been received to date, McCormick said, Blanton

was sworn in at the economic security office for his training that will be from 6 months to a maximum of 2 years in the program with all expenses paid. Within a few days he will be sent to a Job Corps Center to begin his training. The Frankfort **Economic Security Department** office is seeking 25 young men to enroll in the Job Corps during May common McCormick said.

A 20 year old Anderson County man was killed early Sunday morning when the car in which he was riding struck a tree. Sheriff John Birdwhistell identified the victim as John Raymond Cornish of route 1, son of Mr and Mrs Raymond Cornish. State Trooper William Zopff said the accident occurred at 12:30 a.m. on the Puncheon Creek Road about 12 miles southwest of Lawrenceburg the car was driven by Johnny Ellis, 17, of who apparently lost control of the vehicle which ran off the road, side swiped a tree and broke another tree off at the ground. According to the trooper, Cornish's throat was cut by the broken windshield. Ellis, who had suffered minor cuts, was found about a mile away from the

scene of the accident in a dazed condition.

40 YEARS AGO

May 9, 1985 a 48-year-old Bluebird Court woman was to undergo surgery Tuesday morning after allegedly being assault and raped in Anderson and Woodford counties between midnight and 5:00 a.m. Tuesday. according to Craig Birdwhistell, assistant chief of Lawrenceburg police department, the victim reported her attacker broke into her residence sometime after midnight. he is alleged to have assaulted her with a knife threatened her with a gun and raped her at the residence. She reported she shot him with a 22 revolver in the left chest. following the alleged rape and shooting, she said the man forced her into her own vehicle, and had her drive them East on 62 into Woodford County for a short distance. he then had her backtrack to the entrance road to Kentucky Utilities Tyrone Power plant, where he ordered her out of the vehicle and down the entrance Road and raped her again. She reported he next ordered her to drive out Lock

Road in Anderson County about 2 miles off 62 and on to a narrow Lane at this point she reported she was able to get away, but fell down a steep embankment. She said she stayed at the bottom of the cliff until she heard the car start up and leave the scene. She was able to walk to a nearby residence from which the police

were notified at 5:25 a.m. All County employees, except magistrates, will receive at least a 5% raise and pay. Fiscal Court approved new base salaries for All County employees and a special meeting Monday, following the recommendations of a committee consisting of Ron Madden and Ralph Dennis, along with Jim Catlett, judge executive. Madden and Dennis were selected to serve on the committee by Catlett because they are not candidates for re-election, but Madden said the fact didn't make the job much easier. "This was not an easy job and I wish I hadn't been asked to do it," said Madden, noting that he received your complaints. Madden noted the committee saw advice from supervisors and that a few received less money

than requested for their deputies, "but not by a whole lot." Before voting to keep their own salaries at the \$4,120-peryear level they were paid upon taking office more than 3 years ago, some discussion ensued over the possible need for expense account money. magistrate Clinton Sea led the argument for expense money, saying whoever serves the new 5th and 6th districts may need more money for operating expenses due to the large territory involved. the 5th and 6th have been greatly expanded under the new redistricting plan and include the most road miles of any district.

Citing Health reasons, Western Anderson basketball coach Paul Watts officially retired from coaching and teaching after 29 and 1/2 years of service, the last six of which were at Western anderson. watts, who led the Eagles to wins over Anderson County in the 1982 and 1983 District tournaments, had been the subject a speculation all season long with numerous rumors circulating about his possible retirement. he announced at the Western awards banquet that his intentions were to retire but that the decision had changed upon some paperwork to allow him to draw a teacher's retirement. Watson says the decision was one that had to be considered for a long time and is one that is tough to make.

"I didn't really want to give it up," said Anderson County football coach George Fallis upon announcing his resignation early this week. "The doctor told me I didn't have much choice." Fallis, who missed four Bearcat contests last year while recovering from back surgery, says those problems are forcing him to call it quits after 18 years of coaching. Having already undergone two operations and contemplating a third, he feels the rigors of coaching may be too much of a strain on the Troublesome back. An Anderson County native and a graduate of Anderson High, he returned to his home 5 years ago to complete his coaching career. After compiling a 7-0 record at Anderson Middle School in his first year, he took the reins of the slumping program at Anderson High where in 1982 the Bearcats posted their first winning season and several years with a 6-5 mark. The following year the cats had improved to a 7-4 slate. He will continue to teach Health at Anderson Middle School where he instructs both 7th and 8th graders.

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


