# Anderson eligible for SNAP disaster benefits

for Kentucky Counties Following Catastrophic Flooding, Landslides and Mudslides

Residents of or those employed in 13 counties may apply for emergency food assistance through Disaster SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program); current SNAP beneficiaries are eligible for replacement and could be eligible for supplementals benefits due to power outages.

FRANKFORT, Ky. (May 5, 2025) – Residents of 13 Kentucky counties impacted by the April 2 catastrophic flooding, landslides and mudslides that caused structural damage and profound losses are eligible for Disaster Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits, approved May 2, 2025, by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service. D-SNAP applications will be accepted from May 7, 2025, through May 14, 2025, excluding Sunday, May 11, 2025.

The D-SNAP program offers shortterm food help to individuals and families in counties that receive a federal disaster declaration that includes individual assistance. President Donald J. Trump issued a major disaster declaration in Kentucky on April 25.

Disaster SNAP Benefits Approved following thirteen counties are eligible to apply for D-SNAP assistance: Anderson, Butler, Carroll, Christian, Clark, Franklin, Hardin, Hopkins, Jessamine, McCracken, Mercer, Owen and Woodford.

Additionally, residents receiving SNAP benefits or DSNAP benefits in approved counties can purchase hot, prepared food at authorized retailers with their benefits until May 31, 2025.

Residents receiving SNAP benefits can request and apply for a replacement of benefits due to power outages and other impacts. Any SNAP recipient can request replacement and/or supplement of benefits whenever food purchased with SNAP benefits is destroyed due to a household disaster.

"Team Kentucky appreciates the federal emergency funding provided to aid Kentuckians whose homes and properties have been impacted or destroyed by this historic storm," said Gov. Andy Beshear. "It's comforting to know that storm victims can access these crucial benefits that will help their families as they recover and

to receive benefits. Applications will be taken by phone Monday-Friday 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Saturday 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. EDT. Applications may be made at a DCBS office at the addresses below, Monday-Saturday 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. local time.

## Community members gather at courthouse for National Day of Prayer

LAWRENCEBURG — Local residents and members of Ninevah Christian Church gathered on May 1 at the Anderson County Courthouse to observe the annual National Day of Prayer, joining others across the nation in a day of reflection and unity.

The event followed a proclamation by President Donald Trump, who officially designated May 1, 2025, as a National Day of Prayer. In his proclamation, he stated he encourages all Americans to observe this day, reflecting on the blessings our Nation has received and the importance of prayer, with appropriate programs, ceremonies, and activities in their houses of worship, communities, and places of work, schools, and homes.

Locally, the spirit of the day was felt strongly as participants came together to pray for their community, nation, families, churches, and the broader challenges facing the world.

Ninevah Christian Church played a central role in organizing the courthouse gathering. Known in the community as a place of new beginnings, the church promotes a message of grace, healing, and transformation. Members believe God's grace is available to everyone—regardless of their past—and that lives can be restored through faith.

Attendees emphasized that Ninevah is a place where it's "okay to not be okay," offering a welcoming environment where individuals are encouraged to come as they are, without fear of judgment or the pressure to appear perfect.

Carrying that message with them, Ninevah members led prayers and welcomed others to join in moments of shared hope, gratitude, and reflection. The event served as both a religious observance and a reminder of the power of community and faith in challenging times.

our commonwealth - and I'm one of them. The state invested in me when I needed it most, and now I'm honored to give back through my work. Recovery isn't just possible - it's happening."

The Governor has continued to fight the state's drug epidemic since his time as attorney general, when he led the nation in the number of individual opioid lawsuits filed by an attorney general. Now, Gov. Beshear is working to make sure the hundreds of millions of dollars in settlement funds go to treatment and the communities impacted.

Recently, Gov. Beshear announced that Kentucky secured another low recidivism rate. Nearly 70% of people released from state custody over the past two years have not been reincarcerated.


