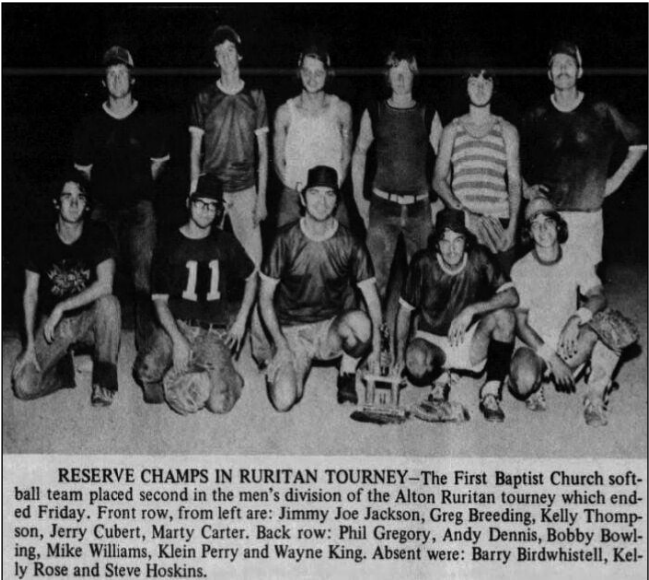
Larries Lose

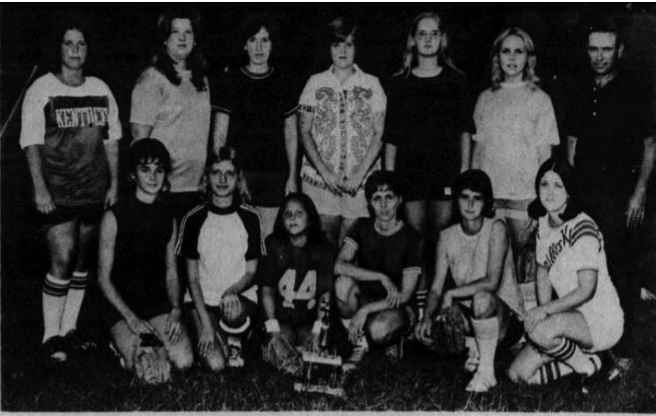

Intentions for the special-called meeting of Anderson Fiscal Court were to continue the discussion on park completion that began at the regularly scheduled meeting Tuesday, to present clear construction figures and to come to a decision about how to proceed. The exact amount for park/land improvements in the 2000 fiscal year is \$136,472. State funds of \$500,000 have been slated by the fiscal court to go toward repayment of already incurred park debt.

“Maybe we should sell bonds and get it all done at once and start paying on it,” Magistrate Randy Peyton suggested.
