Enters University

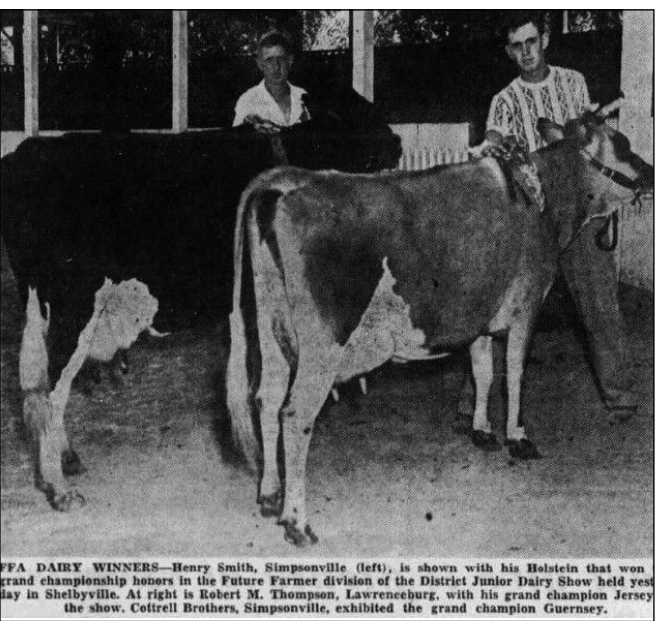
