Casey County's state representative and senator met with city and county officials and the public in a Legislative Coffee held Jan. 31 and discussed taxes, a new Lake Liberty, roads funding and more. The Liberty-Casey County Chamber of Commerce sponsored the event.

Rep. Daniel Elliott and Sen. Brandon Storm are both serving as chairs of their respective Judiciary Committees, which Elliott said put Casey County in a unique situation as having both of their representatives as chairs.

Elliott said that the legislature was busy setting the agenda for the session, and had already

moved on a bill to lessen the state personal income tax rate to 3.5%. He said that as the state continues to meet revenue benchmarks, the rate would be lowered slowly. Ultimately, many legislators would like to see the rate end at 0% for income taxes.

Elliott said that on his agenda is a \$9 million project to construct a new lake to supplement Lake Liberty. The lake would double the water supply for the city and
