2 unvaccinated babies die of whooping cough in Kentucky

Two Kentucky infants sis, commonly known as whooping cough, within the last six months, according to the Kentucky Department for Public Health. These mark the first pertussis-related deaths in Kentucky since 2018.

Neither the infants nor their mothers had been vaccinated against the disease, prompting health officials to urge all Kentuckians to remain up to date on recommended pertussis immunizations, with an emphasis on the importance of maternal immunization during pregnancy

"Anyone can get whoophave died from pertus- ing cough, but infants are at greatest risk for life-threatening illness," Dr. Steven Stack, DPH commissioner, said in a news release. "Fortunately, when vaccinations are administered to pregnant women, it provides protection to both the mother and the baby."

highly contagious respiratory illness spread by coughing and sneezing. Infected people can spread the disease from the start of symptoms and at least two weeks after coughing begins. Early symptoms of whooping cough look like and for all infants begin- a common cold, includ-

mild cough and low-grade fever. After one to two weeks, long coughing spells develop, which often occur in explosive bursts, sometimes ending with a high-pitched whoop and vomiting. This can go on for up to 10 weeks or more, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Babies younger than Whooping cough is a one year old are at greatest risk of getting whooping cough and having severe complications from it. Young infants may not initially present with classic symptoms and may not even have a cough. Instead, they may just struggle to breathe or stop breathing.

Child Find for Children with Disabilities in Need of Special Education or 504 Services & Destruction of Records Notice

The Casey County School District keeps educational records in a secure location in each school nd the Board office

The Casey County School District obtains written consent from a parent or eligible student (age 8 or older who is attending a postsecondary institution) before disclosing personally identifiable inormation to an entity or individual not authorized to receive it under FERPA.

For students who have been determined eligible for Special Education, educational records will be destroyed at the request of the parents when they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services

The Casey County School District may destroy the educational records of a child without a parent's request three years after they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. Parents are advised that data contained in the records may later be required for Social Secur ity benefits or other purposes. The date for records destruction is July 15, 2025.

The Casey County School District may retain, for an indefinite time, a record of the student's name, address, telephone number, grades, attendance records, classes attended, grade level completed, and year completed.

Children eligible for Special Education include those children with disabilities who have autism, deaf-blindness, developmental delay, emotional-behavior disability, hearing impairment, mental disability, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairment, other health impairment, specific learning disabil ity, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury, or visual impairment and who because of such an impairment need Special

Children eligible for 504 services include children in a public elementary and secondary education program who have a current physical or mental impairment that currently substantially limits some major life activity, which causes the student's ability to access the school environment or school activities to be substantially limited.

Children eligible for the State-Funded Preschool program include three- and four-year-old children identified with disabilities and four-year-old children who are at-risk, as defined by federal poverty levels up to 160%. Preschool children eligible for special education must have an Individual Education Plan (IEP) instead of a 504 plan to receive State-Funded Preschool program services

The Casey County School District has an ongoing "Child Find" system, which is designed to locate, identify, and evaluate any child residing in a home, facility, or residence within its geographical boundaries, age three (3) to twenty-one (21) years, who may have a disability and need Special Education or 504 services. This includes children who are not in school; those who are in public, private, or home school; those who are highly mobile, such as children who are migrant or homeess; and those who are advancing from grade to grade, who may need but are not receiving Special Education or 504 services.

The district's "Child Find" system includes children with disabilities attending private or home schools within the school district boundaries who may need special education services.

The Casey County School District will make sure any child enrolled in its district who qualifies for

Special Education or 504 services, regardless of how severe the disability, is provided appropriate Special Education or 504 services at no cost to the parents of the child. Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees, and concerned citizens are urged to

nelp the Casey County School District find any child who may have a disability and need Special Education or 504 services. The District needs to know the name and age, or date of birth of the child; the name, address, and phone number(s) of the parents or guardian; the possible disability; and other information to determine if Special Education or 504 services are needed Letters and phone calls are some of the ways the Casey County School District collects the in-

formation needed. The information the school District collects will be used to contact the parents of the child and find out if the child needs to be evaluated or referred for Special Education or 504 ser If you know of a child who lives within the boundaries of the Casey County School District, who

may have a disability and may need but is not receiving Special Education or 504 services, please call Director Angel Stephens or send the information to:

As part of these efforts, the Caey County School District will use screening information, student records, and basic assessment information it collects on all children in the District to help locate those children who have a disability and need Special Education or 504 services.
