"All 4-Hers who participate in county, regional, or state fairs are winners," said Kimberly Schrader, extension specialist for 4-H Youth Development. "They walk away with more than ribbonsthey gain confidence, skills, and a sense of accomplishment that lasts a lifetime."

All members of the public are invited and encouraged to visit the 4-H Cloverville exhibit during the fair to celebrate the achievements of Kentucky's youth and to learn more about the impact of 4-H in their local communities.
