PSC announces pipeline safety events in Ashland

ASHLAND The Kentucky Public Service Commission will conduct Pipeline Strike Response Training events across Kentucky, including Ashland on Tuesday, May 20.

It will be at the Ashland Train Depot at 99 15th Street.

The trainings will showcase best practices for excavation and appropriate responses to gas pipeline incidents for utility operators and emergency responders, according to a press release.

The demonstration will highlight line locations, routing pre-excavation practices, a simulated pipeline strike and the appropriate response for all participants to a gas pipeline incident.

There will be a response segment and an inclass portion as well.

The event is in collaboration with Kentucky 811, Duke Energy of Kentucky, Inc., Atmos Energy Corporation, Columbia Gas of Kentucky, the National Utility Contractors Association, Martin Contracting, Spartan Construction and local emergency responders.

The events are free and open to all interested parties, according to the release. Advance registration is recommended. Lunch will be provided.

The first session will be from 11:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The second session is scheduled for 3:45 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Farmers market vouchers info

Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Voucher Cards will be distributed from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. May 28-30 at the Boyd County Extension Office, at 2420 Center St.

Vouchers will be distributed on a first come, first served basis. Applicants must bring proof of Boyd County residency, such as a driver's license or state-issued ID. Anyone who received a voucher card last year must re-apply this year. However, if they still have their card from last year, they can reload it if their application for this year is approved.

Low-income seniors may qualify for the Senior Farmers Market Voucher program at the Boyd County Farmers Market. To qualify, the individual must be 60 or older on the day of issuance and have an income level of 185% or less of the Federal Poverty Income Guidelines. Qualifying seniors receive \$50 in the form of an EBT/debit card to purchase fresh, unprocessed, locally grown fruits, honey, vegetables and fresh

More images considered for death penalty trial

CATLETTSBURG The Commonwealth has filed motions to admit more photos and video footage into evidence in a death penalty case stemming from a double homicide in Ashland in June 2022.

John Tooson V, of Rossford, Ohio, ap-

peared in Boyd County Circuit Court via videoconference from across the street in the detention center on Thursday.

A pre-trial is set for June 12. A hearing is now scheduled for July 3 regarding the photos and video footage discussed Thursday in front of Judge John Vincent.

"We need to sit down and figure that part out," said Sebastian Joy, Tooson's defense attorney, referring to what photos and videos will be admitted into evidence.

Tooson will eventually go on trial for the murders of Selina Easter and Summer Algarakhuly. The double homicide

occurred in June 2022 in East Ashland. He is charged with two counts of murder, first-degree wanton endangerment, first-degree robbery and convicted felon in possession of a handgun.

He remains in Boyd County Detention Center on no bond.

Woman pleads guilty to facilitation

CATLETTSBURG A Huntington woman was sentenced to five years of active time in jail and five years of probation after pleading guilty to criminal facilitation on Thursday in Boyd County Circuit Court.

Lisa M. Jones, 36, was indicted on trafficking charges in November 2024. Those were amended to facilitation to trafficking.

The Commonwealth's At-

torney's Office and Kentucky State Police agreed Jones was too intoxicated to be fully aware of what was transpiring when she was a passenger in a vehicle allegedly involved in trafficking heroin (100 grams or more), fentanyl (greater than 28 grams), marijuana (between 8 ounces and 5 pounds), cocaine (more than 4 grams) and an unspecified drug.

The charges involving fentanyl and heroin resulted in consecutive sentences — five years apiece

— while the others were to run

concurrently.

Judge John Vincent communicated the final sentence, which includes five years of active time and five years probated. Jones will also be in an inpatient treatment program.

Mediation is scheduled on June 25 for Jerry J. Ellis, 30, of Detroit, who is the suspected driver in the case, according to court documents.
