FDA issues health alert about Louisville food distributor

Administration announced Tuesday that it is advising consumers, distributors and retailers not to eat, sell or serve products distributed by Pan-African Food Distributors of Louisville.

A May FDA inspection of the firm's distribution center in Louisville revealed the presence of an active rodent infestation and numerous rodent droppings on multiple product containers. FDA issued a public health alert to notify the customers and African Food Distributors consumers about the public recall all products of concern health risk that these products

State government has mandated the firm halt operations due to the absence of a required permit and also implemented a blanket quarantine of its product. The state is urging the voluntary disposal of all contaminated food and will prohibit the business from reopening until the infestation is completely

addressed.

Parents and caregivers The U.S. Food and Drug should not feed children products distributed by Pan-African Food Distributors, which also does business as East Africa Boutique LLC. Retailers and distributors that purchased or received products from Pan-African Distributors should not sell or serve those products and should clean and sanitize any surfaces or containers that could have come in contact with potentially contaminated goods.

FDA recommended Pancurrently on the market and the firm has agreed, the statement said.

Consumers should check their homes for products described in the safety alert and discard all products, the notice said. Additionally, consumers should carefully clean and sanitize surfaces that could have come in contact with potentially contaminated products.



Ordinance 2025-06 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A TOURISM COMMISSION FOR LEITCHFIELD, KY

WHEREAS, The City of Leitchfield, KY previously by ordinance established a Tourism and Convention Commission compensa-WHEREAS, the City Council had determined that the members


