National Public Health Week: It starts here

Where we live impacts our communities' health. We can make our communities healthier, stronger, and safer. The 2025 National Public Health Week theme is "It Starts Here" because public health starts with each of us making a difference in our homes and communities.

The Lake Cumberland District Health Department's mission is to promote and protect the health of all who live, work, learn, and play throughout the district. Doctors and nurse practitioners primarily treat individuals after they become sick or injured. Public health professionals work to prevent problems from happening or recurring by implementing educational programs,

recommending policies, promoting healthy lifestyles, assuring a safe environment, and detecting and controlling infectious diseases.

As we celebrate the 30th National Public Health Week, April 7-13, one of the key ideas highlighted is the importance of public health initiatives as investments in the future. Funding for prevention programs, disease surveillance, vaccination campaigns, and other health services saves lives and reduces healthcare costs over time. Rather than waiting for health crises to arise, public health departments advocate for a proactive approach to health that focuses on prevention, early intervention, and education.

Local State of Emergency Declaration issued

A declaration of a local state of emergency was issued by Green County Judge-Executive John Frank April 4, 2025 regarding the April 2 storm with major amounts of rainfall occurring in Green County, whereas the situation creates a considerable hardship for the citizens of Green County.

It requires the following directives:

(1) Local emergency personnel and the Green County Road Department to have roadways open for emergency vehicles.

(2) Local government has the responsibility to protect the public health, safety and welfare, and to mitigate the effects of such events.

Judge-Executive Frank, by Kentucky statute KRS 39A.100(2), declares a State

of Emergency exists in Green County for the period of no less than one week.

The emergency declaration states:

(1) The local Emergency Operations Plan shall be fully executed.

(2) The Green County Emergency Management Director shall direct the County Emergency Service to provide such assistance,

Officer Keltner deemed hero

On April 4, Hodgenville Police Officer and Green County native Josh Keltner was asked to respond to the area of Dangerfield Road on a flooded roadway, due there being no Larue County Sheriff's Deputy on duty.

Officer Keltner responded

and was waiting for the state road department to arrive when a call of a house fire was dispatched.

Officer Keltner again responded to a call for service, for which he was not responsible, as soon as he heard the call for help. Arriving first on scene, he found flames rising from the roof of the home. He

found that there were two individuals inside the home; one of which was an elderly male that had fallen from a wheelchair. Without hesitation, Officer Keltner entered the burning home and assisted both victims to safety.

According to fire officials, Officer Keltner's selfless actions saved the man's life.
