"I know this will help our admissions representatives, especially when it comes to working with international students who often confuse the term 'college' with 'high school' because of where they live," she said. "This move is very good for Lindsey Wilson's long-term future, as this school will continue to change students' lives because of faculty and staff who encourage them and provide them a solid foundation to launch successful careers."

Lindsey Wilson Student Government Association President Zachariah Lawson '26 said that he and his fellow students are excited about the change, especially after meeting with Luckey earlier this school year to discuss it.

"The mission of this school is not going to change," said Lawson, an English major from Williamsburg, Kentucky, who will be in the first class to graduate from Lindsey Wilson University. "Lindsey Wilson is still going to be committed to serving every student, every day, which is its greatest strength and what is at the heart of Lindsey Wilson."

a training school for Vanderbilt University, Lindsey Wilson became a junior college in 1923. The school was transformed into a baccalaureate degree-granting college in 1985, and it offered its first graduate program in 1993. The college now offers 28 undergraduate majors, five graduate programs and a doctoral program.

Luckey said that people who have supported Lindsey Wilson over the years are often imbued with "this irrational passion for this place that just grabs your heart and soul and won't let go."

"There is something unique and special that's part of our institutional DNA and has been since 1903," Luckey said. "We are a universe of one with an institutional culture that cannot be replicated or duplicated."

• Currently, Green-Taylor Water District assesses a \$1.50 fee for credit/debit card transactions. Green-Taylor Water District is proposing to change its tariff to state the following: "When a customer makes a payment by credit card or debit card, the processor (not the District) will assess a convenience fee for providing this service. Prior to processing the transaction, the customer will be informed of the fee amount." The amount of the convenience fee assessed by the processor will be actual cost."

• Green-Taylor Water District's customers mail in their meter readings monthly. Green-Taylor is requesting as part of its leak adjustment policy that to be eligible for a leak adjustment the customer must submit actual monthly meter readings to the District so that the customers adjustment is based on actual usage and not estimated readings.

• Green-Taylor Water District is proposing to change delinquent penalty from the 20th day of the month following the month of water usage to the 15th day of the month following the month of water usage.

• Green-Taylor Water District is proposing to change the disconnect date for nonpayment from the 15th day of the month following the month the bill is received to payment must be received by end of business day on the 20th day of the month following the month of water usage or customer will be subject to disconnect on the 21st.

• Green-Taylor Water District proposes to add ACH-Bank Draft/Automatic policy to its tariff. Where the customer can elect to have their bill paid by bank draft to the District at no charge to the customer. The ACH-Bank Draft will be withdrawn on the 10 of each month.

If the PSC does not receive a written request for intervention within thirty (30) days of the initial publication or mailing of notice, the PSC may take final action on the tariff filing.
