

HCHS Graduation Requirements amended at Board of Education Meeting By Jennifer Wimmer Once the new schedule

The Hancock Coun-

ty Board of Education met on Thursday, April 24th, and made the approval to adopt a 7-period classroom schedule at Hancock County High School, as well as to adjust the required number of graduation credits going forward. Beginning next school

year ('25/'26), HCHS will be transitioning to a 7-period day, which will also increase the length of each class time by eight minutes (from 42 to 50 minutes). This adjustment will allow for more instructional

time in each class, while reducing the overall number of classes students take. As a result, this will also impact the total number of credits required for graduation. In accordance with the schedule modification, the HCHS graduation credit require-

ments will be adjusted by class year. The Class

of 2025 is currently required to have 26

to graduate.
