The shop's most popular item, Morris said, is probably their swings.

"Both of us believe that a person should get what they paid for," he said. "And we try our best to make things out of the best quality wood. We handpick it at the stores. We don't cheap out on the screws or anything like that. We try to get everything coated to withstand the outdoor weather, which is not always the cheapest. Tyler's taken on the job of sealing the finished pieces, and we put three coats of sealer on just to make sure that it will stand up to the weather. It's just nice to know that people are going to have a product that is going to last, and they're going to spread the word for us and that's what has happened."

In addition to swings, the pair offers items as small as cutting boards, onion and potato boxes and trash cans, to a variety of swing options, pergolas, what children refer to as "lifeguard" chairs, according to Morris, and they even tackle custom projects and the job of refinishing pieces for clients, too

"The most popular swing style would be the Adiron-dack-style. We just can't keep them made up enough for the demand. It's just crazy to know that people are buying them like that. They take a little longer to make because they have the fan back. But when Tyler has burned them, they're gone the next week," Morris said.

Harris said that he enjoys the job because he gets to try new things and be creative with his work. He recently began trying out a technique inspired by the Japanese "shou sugi ban," a traditional Japanese wood preservation method involving purposely charring clean wood to create a more textured-looking surface on the wood, according to



thespruce.com.

"When the technique is executed correctly, it offers practical advantages," stated the website.

Harris said that he was "just having fun with fire."

"I burned a little test piece and it looked cool, so I talked to Dennis about trying to use the technique on a swing and see how it looks," he explained. "It looked awesome, and we had it our on display for not even a week and someone came out and bought it. We started doing it on other pieces, chairs, the potato and onion boxes and cutting boards."

People seem to really enjoy the look of those pieces, Harris said. And the prices? Both Morris and Harris feel that, for the quality of the products provided, the prices are more than reasonable.

"Prices can range anywhere from \$200 to \$300 for a swing, depending on the specifications. We've had people come out and say that they were looking at swings online and the prices were almost double what we sell them. And you're not getting the same quality that we provide," Morris said.

"And a lot of times, those swings come in a box that you have to put together," Harris added. "I believe that you shouldn't be able to walk out of a store carrying your

swing in a box."

Morris explained that all of the joints on the pieces are both screwed together and glued together. He said that this technique provides the finished products with more stability.

"But that also makes it more difficult for us to bring some of our larger pieces to craft shows," he said. "We have a lot of people at the shows ask if items can be dismantled to fit into a car, and we just can't because it takes away from the stability of the product."

The duo said that they usually have a booth at the Owensboro Convention Center's annual craft show, Kraftucky, along with setting up at a variety of local festivals and events such as the Pickle and Strawberry Festivals held at the Cottage Farm Stand on Highway 56 on the outskirts of Owensboro.

Harris said that one of the most fulfilling projects that they do is refinishing pieces.

"The work can be really fulfilling and provide a sense of accomplishment, especially when we are refinishing a project. It's cool when it's something that the person hasn't seen look brand new or close to new in years. When they see the piece refinished, it's

awesome. We just finished redoing a chest for someone, and it was in really rough shape, but we got it fixed up and it looked brand new. They absolutely loved it and said the finished project exceeded their expectations, which is always a nice compliment," he said.

But the duo both agree that painting their finished products is something they enjoy doing.

"I will paint things if I have to," Morris said. "But neither of us likes covering up the look of the wood."

Harris added that he's even built custom concealment tables, tables with hidden compartments to store firearms, flashlights or other items that need to be hidden, for buyers.

"I wanted to keep one for myself," he laughed. "I have pictures on it that I saved, and I wish we had it here. I made two different styles, one with a fingerprint scanner, where the top slide back, and another style with a card scanner, where the entire drawer slid out. It was awesome."
