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EF-1 TORNADO CONFIRMED IN LOGAN

n EF-1 tornado touched down in Logan County Friday night, the National Weather Service in Louisville confirmed. While no one in Logan County was injured, the death toll in Kentucky from Friday's storms reached 19, Gov. Andy Beshear announced Sunday.

Tornadoes, wind and hail tore across Southern Kentucky from Friday evening into Saturday morning, leaving widespread destruction. Seventeen deaths were confirmed in Laurel County and one in Pulaski, with victims ranging in age from 25 to 76.

Residents of Todd, Christian, and Trigg counties woke up Saturday morning to damage after tornadoes went through the area. **Christian County Emergency** Management Director Randy Graham said Christian County had quite a bit of damage throughout the county with power outages, downed trees and power lines.

The National Weather Service confirmed on Sunday that two tornadoes went through Christian County, one an EF2.
