Isaiah 117 House opens first Kentucky location in Logan

A crowd gathered Friday to celebrate the grand opening and ribbon-cutting of the Isaiah 117 House, the first of its kind in Kentucky and the 32nd location for the national nonprofit. The organization's mission is to provide a welcoming space for children in the initial hours of and caring volunteers. foster care.

The house, located in Russellville, is designed to be a safe haven for children who are being removed from their homes. Instead of spending those first hours in a sterile office, children can now find a comfortable bed, a warm meal.

Lori Gafford, who initiated the project after seeing a video about the organization, now serves as the location leader. She said the vision began with five foster mothers and has since grown into a

Petition forces vote on Logan County school tax

A petition to put a special "nickel tax" on the ballot for a county-wide from the nickel tax can vote has been certified as sufficient, according to County Clerk Stacy Watkins. The petition challenges a tax levied by the Logan County Board of Education on June 6.

The petition, which was filed by John Dawson, Daniel Kemp, Lonnie Epley, Jon Keith Smith, and John Walpole, asked that the tax be placed on the ballot for a countywide vote.

Dawson was contacted for comment and said, "I am not sure I have anything or not."

The school board had unanimously approved the tax to address several facility needs, including overcrowding at Auburn Elementary and aging infrastructure like HVAC systems and roofs at other schools. The revenue from the tax is restricted to capital projects such as new construction and major renovations and cannot be used for salaries or other operational expenses.

Funds generated only be used for major renovations of existing school facilities, new construction, or debt service. These funds cannot be used for other purposes, such as salaries.

According to KRS, the petition required 1,043 qualified voters' signatures. According to Watkins, petitioners collected 1,756 signatures. Despite several reasons for being rejected, including Russellville Independent School District residency, wrong birth date information, duplicate signatures, and being non-registered voters, Watkins confirmed that her office determined 1,561 of them met the requirements of KRS 132.017(2)©. The petition contains enough signatures to place the ordinance, resolution, or motion before the Logan
