Cougars, Lady Cougars split DH against Russellville

Logan County hosted an exciting night of soccer on Tuesday, as a double header featured the long-time heated rivalry between local programs. In the opening bout, the Logan County Lady Cougars went toe-to-toe with the Russellville Lady Panthers in the first "Clash of the Cats" of the season. After 80 minutes of action, the match fell in favor of the Lady Cougars 5-0, earning their second district win of the season. Following the girls' game, the Logan County Cougars took on the Russellville Panthers in what was a tightly contested match. The Panthers would earn their first victory of the season, clawing their way to a 1-0 win over the Cougars.

The Lady Cougars offense got off to a hot start as Katelyn Haas earned the first goal of the game and her first goal of the season with just seven minutes gone in the first half. Sophomores Adalyn Rogers and Luna Sanchez and junior Samara Corbin also found the back of the net, earning their first goals of the year, giving the Lady Cougars a 4-0 lead going into the half.

Head Coach Barry McReynolds remained adamant that the team stay aggressive during the second half. "This game is not done yet; we have to be all gas and no brakes, we can't let up and get comfortable. We have to start fine-tuning and perfect what we did in the first half. There is still a lot of work to be done,

but we are getting better; we just have to keep pushing," McReynolds said. The Lady Cougars earned another goal in the second half courtesy of Kaylee Poe to finish out the game. As for the Lady Panthers, the offense generated a few opportunities on goal, with shots from Olivia Sayne and Lexie De La Cruz.

In the nightcap, the Panthers and the Cougars battled it out in what was a low-scoring affair, with each goalkeeper playing lockdown defense. For the Panthers, senior Noah Harris earned the shutout, with no goals allowed and 14 saves in goal. As for the Cougars, Sophomore Aidyn Bryan tallied 13 saves with just the one goal allowed. The lone goal scored came from the Panthers' Charles Graves off the assist from Braxton Coleman with just under five to go in the first half. The Cougars offense, led by Asher Woodall, had multiple opportunities with shots on goal but could not finish with narrow misses.

Looking ahead on the schedule, the Panthers will host Greenwood tonight. As for the Cougars, they look to get back in the win column as they host Muhlenberg County tonight. The Lady Panthers will travel tonight to East Robertson (TN) for their next match, as the Lady Cougars will host their next game on Saturday against Christian County.

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CITY OF ADAIRVILLE, KENTUCKY ORDINANCE NO. 2025-A-4

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO STREET-LEGAL SPECIAL PURPOSE VEHICLES

WHEREAS, 2025 Ky. Acts ch. 89 (hereinafter "the Act") became law on March 26, 2025 and allows for the operation of street-legal special purpose vehicles on certain highways within the Commonwealth of Kentucky if allows by ordinance of the local gov-ernment within whose jurisdictional boundaries the highway is

WHEREAS, the Act became effective Friday, June 27, 2025; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Adairville, Kentucky has determined that it is appropriate to allow the operation of street-legal special purpose vehicles on specified highways within the jurisdictional boundaries of the City of Adairville in accordance with the Act and this ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Adairville, Kentucky:

SECTION 1.

Definitions The definitions set forth in Section 1(1) of the 2025 Ky. Acts ch. 89 (hereinafter "the Act"), and as may be amended in the future by the Kentucky General Assembly, are adopted and incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein.

SECTION 2.

Designated Highways Street-legal special purpose vehicles shall be allowed to the ex-tent permitted by the Act on all highways that are located within the jurisdictional limits of the City of Adairville.

SECTION 3.

Exceptions Street-legal special purpose vehicles shall not be allows to oper-

(a) On any highway, or portion thereof, that is a controlled access system, including but not limited to an interstate or parkway

o(b) On any highway, or portion thereof, where the United States Department of Agriculture prohibits special purpose vehicles.

SECTION 4.

Prohibitions Minitrucks shall not be operated as street-legal special purpose vehicles on a highway that has been constructed pursuant to a ederal highway program.

SECTION 5.

Effective Date The foregoing ordinance having received its first reading on the 14th day of July, 2025 was given its second reading and passed by the City Council of the City of Adairville, Kentucky on this the 11th day of August, 2025.
