Lady Cougars sweep Wildcats, stay unbeaten in district

Tuesday night the vaunted Logan County Lady Cougars volleyball program played host to its second district matchup against the visiting Franklin-Simpson Lady Wildcats. It was also their annual Pink-Out night in support of Breast Cancer Awareness, as the Lady Cougars donned their pink jerseys in front of a crowd sporting pink for the occasion. The Lady Cougars earned the sweep, winning all three sets, 25-6, 25-12, and the third coming down to the wire with a score of 25-23. The Lady Cougars improved their record to 6-5 on the season and remained undefeated in district play with wins over the Lady Wildcats and the Russellville Lady Panthers.

Coming off a strong weekend performance at the Apollo Summer Slam Down Tournament, where they won four games against just two losses, Coach Steven Lyne gave some brief comments on their performance and the game against Franklin-Simpson. "One of the big things is, over the past weekend, the girls played really well, and we beat some good teams. I was a little disappointed with that last game, because we didn't carry that intensity over here tonight. Those are just things we have to work onstaying disciplined, trying to finish betterbut I'm glad we got the win. There are definitely still things we need to work on though." Lyne put an emphasis on not being complacent and working to get better and keep push-

The first set saw the teams' freshmen and seniors dominate the scorecard, with kills coming from Bella Cron, Caroline Ham, Kirsten Harris, and freshman Addison Pitts, who had two aces and the game point to close out the first series. The second set for the Lady Cougars saw Harris continue to be a prime hitter with multiple kills and an ace. Emily and Ashley McIntosh were active as hitters as well in the first two sets. The third set saw the Lady Cougars fall behind by four with the Lady Wildcats' biggest lead of the night. Facing the match point, with a 24-18 deficit, the Lady Wildcats narrowed the lead by one, but the Lady Cougars would bury the game winner, closing out the chance for the

comeback. Looking ahead, the Lady Cougars will wait to play until Tuesday, as they will go on the road in the district to take on the Todd County Central Lady Rebels for their first meeting of the season. The Lady Cougars will try to keep their undefeated streak going in the 13th District as they close out their regular season at the end of this month.
