

Crestwood car dealership damaged by fire

Fire breaks out at Glenn car dealership

CRESTWOOD — Multiple fire departments responded to a structure fire at Glenn Chrysler Dodge Jeep Ram on June 22 around 10 a.m.

Located on the corner of Veterans Memorial Parkway and Highway 146, alerts were issued warning citizens of the temporary closure of West Highway 146. The intersection was closed for several hours to ensure safe operations.

South Oldham Fire Assistant Chief Kevin Parker ran command for the incident. He told the Era that police were first on scene due to an alarm they were responding to, and that they first discovered the fire.

“I had — and I’m not exaggerating — the biggest plume of smoke I have ever seen ... The fire was already through the roof when we got here,” Parker said.

Multiple units from almost every fire department in the county were present on scene, as well as those from Oldham

County Emergency Management, EMS, sheriff’s deputies and police officers. Over 65 firefighters were present on scene, according to South Oldham Fire.

“We had four aerial operations in operation at the exact same time to try to control the fire, and there were multiple explosions when I got on scene as well.”

Though the fire was primarily

involved, which was at higher risk due to 90-degree weather.

Shelby County Fire, Lake Jericho Fire and Anchorage Middletown provided coverage while crews were occupied on scene.

Damage to the interior was extensive, especially in the service area.


A post on the Glenn car dealership’s Facebook page says that their top priority is getting back on their feet to serve their customers.

Owner Nathan Stahl told the Era that he was thankful for the community support he has received thus far, and especially appreciative of the Oldham County first responders who he called “world class.”

Stahl also said that he expects the dealership to be open by the end of the week, once they regain power, as three service bays will be operational. Some service work may be moved to the Eminence branch while restorations take place.

Though they may not currently be working in the same capacity that they are used to, Stahl also said that all of his employees will be able to work.

“We will be back stronger than ever,” Stahl said in spite of the setback.

**CITY OF BEDFORD, KENTUCKY
ORDINANCE NO. 4 SERIES 2025**

AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING .82 ACRES, MORE OR LESS, PRESENTLY OWNED BY BRIAN DE DIEGO AND LORI LANGONA AND LOCATED EAST OF U.S. HIGHWAY 421, APPROXIMATELY 2,400 FEET NORTH OF CUTSHAW LANE, CONTIGUOUS TO THE PRESENT CITY LIMITS

WHEREAS, pursuant to KRS 81A.412, the City of Bedford, Kentucky may annex any area which meets the requirements for annexation if the owner of record of the land to be annexed gives prior consent in writing; and

WHEREAS, the property which is the subject of this ordinance is adjacent or contiguous to the City's present boundaries and is urban in character; and

WHEREAS, no part of the area to be annexed is included within the boundary of another incorporated city; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to annex the subject property into the City limits; and

WHEREAS, the owners of record of the subject property, Brian De Diego and Lori Langona, have consented in writing to the proposed annexation as shown by their consent dated prior to the first reading of this ordinance and therefore, pursuant to KRS 81A.412, the City is not required to enact a notification ordinance as would otherwise be required by KRS 81A.420(1) or comply with the notice requirements set forth in KRS 81A.425 or wait the 60 day period provided for in KRS 81A.420(2) prior to enacting a final ordinance annexing the subject area.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the City of Bedford, Kentucky, as follows:

SECTION 1. ANNEXATION AND LEGAL DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY.

The City of Bedford, Kentucky, declares the following described property, by reason of present use and potential, to be urban in character and/or suitable for development for urban purposes without reasonable delay. The City declares it desirable to annex the following described property, owned by Brian De Diego and Lori Langona, who consent to the annexation. Accordingly, said property is hereby annexed into the territorial limits of the City of Bedford, Kentucky, a home rule municipality, formerly referred to as a sixth-class municipality, pursuant to the provisions of KRS 81 A.420 et seq., and the boundaries of the City are hereby extended so as to include and incorporate all of this real estate into the City of Bedford.

The property hereby annexed into the City of Bedford is described as follows:

Being a certain tract of land in Bedford, Trimble County, Kentucky, located east of U.S. Highway 421, approximately 2,400 feet north of Cutshaw Lane and being more particularly described as follows:

Commencing at a found 1/2" rebar with cap stamped #3047; said 1/2" rebar being in the northeast right of way Highway 421; thence leaving said right of way, N 63°04'41" E, a distance of 103.72 feet to a point, said point being the True Point of Beginning; thence N 31°53'03" W, a distance of 49.91 feet to a point; thence N 26°08'19" W, a distance of 173.32 feet to aa point; thence N 80°20'33" E, a distance of 196.67 feet to a found 1/2" rebar with no cap; thence S 23°14'32" E, a distance of 165.00 feet to a found 1/2" rebar with cap stamped #3047; thence S 63°04'41" W, a distance of 175.28 feet to the point of beginning.

Having an area of 35,751 square feet or 0.820 acres.

Being a portion of the same property conveyed to Brian De Diego & Lori Langona as recorded in Deed Book 157, Page 544. All deeds on file in the Office of the County Clerk of Trimble County, Kentucky.

SECTION 2. ZONING CLASSIFICATION.

The annexed property shall retain its current zoning classification and remain subject to the same land use restrictions that applied to it prior to annexation until changed by zoning map amendments or other proper procedure.

This Ordinance shall take effect upon enactment by the City Commission of the City of Bedford, Kentucky, and proper publication as required by law.

LA GRANGE — Baptist Health La Grange and Baptist Health Louisville have successfully completed a joint accreditation survey with the National Accreditation Program for Breast Centers (NAPBC) through the American College of Surgeons (ACS).

There are only seven NAPBC accredited breast cancer programs in Kentucky. This is the first accreditation for the breast program at Baptist

Health La Grange.

To achieve voluntary NAPBC accreditation, a breast center demonstrates compliance with the NAPBC standards that address a center’s leadership, clinical services, research, community outreach, professional education and quality improvement for patients.

Lindsay Arnold, MD, a surgeon at Baptist Health La Grange and Baptist Health Louisville, leads the breast cancer program at Baptist Health La Grange.
