Nicholas County School Board recognizes Upward Bound participants and board member Brenda Mattox

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Members of the Nicholas County Board of Education, including Superintendent Doug Bechanan, met on Monday, Oct. 20, 2025, at 6:00pm, at the Nicholas County Board of Education office, for their regularly scheduled monthly meeting.

Board Chair Cheryl Rawlings called the meeting to order with roll call, with all board members present, sans board member Brenda Mattox, who attended the evenings meeting by phone.

The board proudly recognized that "Nicholas County currently has 5 students participating in the Upward Bound program, and each of them had shared powerful feedback about how the program is shaping their future."

"Josue Clay, a senior who has participated since his freshman year, values the program for helping students become college-ready, while still having fun. He also highlighted the opportunity to meet new people from different counties and form lasting friendships."

"Timothy Taulbee, a junior in his second year with Upward Bound, shared that his favorite part of the program is the strong camaraderie among students and staff. He appreciates how easy they are to talk to and how enjoyable the environment is."

"Danica Amburgey explained that Upward Bound has made a meaningful impact on her life. She has built

The board also recognized and congratulated

The board approved Pay Applications, Direct Purchase Orders, and/or Invoices for the Nicholas Co. High School Athletic Renovation Project, at the discretion of the superintendent, to Momentum Construction, LLC for \$48,701.72, and to Lee Building Products for \$5,648.50. The athletic project is around 95% completed, with only a section sidewalk, concrete work,

and fencing to be completed. The press box for the baseball field is finished, and seed/and straw has been placed, as well.

The board approved BG4 for the Nicholas County High School Turf project, and to submit a BG4 to KDE, as part of the project close-out. This will begin the closeout procedure for the installed turf at the football field.

The board approved to amend the 2025-2026 Classified Salary Schedule to include EL-EVATE GEAR UP Success Coach position for the district with a 190-day contract / 8-hour day, with the stated salary schedule. It is a classified position, and the pay is based on similar positions within the Nicholas County School system. The project would begin with 6th and 7th grades, and would continue moving forward through till graduation, which would focus on academics, mentoring, social and emotional dynamics, setting goals, etc., through a 7-year grant. Supt. Bechanan said that Nicholas County Schools is "very fortunate to have a program like this in Nicholas County."

The board approved to adopt the KISTA Participation Resolution, approving to participate in KISTA to purchase a school bus in 2025-2026, at an approximate cost of between \$172,000.00 to \$174,000.00, and that going through this route

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\$3,000.00 anonymous donation for the Mathers Fund. Judge-Exec. Hamilton said this anonymous donor had previously benefited from the fund and simply wanted to give back to a fund that so generously helps the community.

The court approved the Jailer's 2025 incentive payment of \$3,976.59 for completed training; approved the 2nd reading of a budget amendment, with no changes from the 1st reading; approved the treasurer's transfers and treasurer's report; approved the sale of two of the 22 not-in-use hospital beds, stored at the road department, to Timothy Highfield, and approved to advertise the remaining 20 beds as donations to county residents that are in need, with one bed per, unless other needs is shown; and approved the Liberty Tree Project, through the Kentucky Historical Society in conjunction of the upcoming 250 anniversary of the United States, which will plant a tree in Nicholas County, as one of 120

trees that will be planted in each Kentucky county.

Before going into closed session, the court approved the Sheriff's report. The court then went into closed session, and resumed some time later, with no action taken while in closed session.

Following closed session, the court approved the termination of a former Nicholas County Courthouse Custodian and approved the resignations of Nicholas County EMS members Justin McVey and Kristy Nelson; approved a master/referral agreement through Bluegrass ADD utilizing co-op students for courthouse work; and approved the workforce development referral process, as well.

Before adjournment,

the court discussed repairing potholes, spoke about the upcoming Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays, and spoke about Willowbrook Healthcare and the rising number of residents at the facility.

Before adjournment, Road Department Supervisor Pat Dunn said that there was 70 to 80 tons of salt on hand for the upcoming winter season, and that 300 more tons had been ordered.

The court also reminded everyone about the food bank located in the courthouse, for anyone in need, will be going on for a while, thanks to generous donations from county residents and local churches.

The meeting was subsequently adjourned.

A copy of the adopted ordinance with full text is available for public inspection at the office of the county judge/executive during normal business hours.

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
