LOCAL CHURCH SUED

The High Street Baptist Church on Bourne Ave. and its Board of Trustees is being sued by two of its members. The lawsuit, filed Tuesday in Pulaski County Circuit Court, states the plaintiff, Jack Roney, tripped and fell on church steps which were described as being in a "defective or dangerous condition" on April 7, 1985. He is suing for \$30,000 in past medical expenses plus any future expenses. In addition, Roney's wife, Dorothy Roney, is suing the church for "... an amount sufficient to compensate her for loss of consortium, with interest on all of said damages" A Danville lawyer representing the Roneys said Jack Roney suffered a knee injury requiring extensive medical treatment.

HAPPENING AROUND TOWN:

-Music and humor was in store for local audiences as the seventh annual Red Stocking Revue was presented Friday and Saturday at the W.B. Jones Auditorium. This year the benefit show, sponsored by the GFWC-KF'WC Somerset Junior Woman's Club, will aid the Pulaski County Public Library. First-year performer Arnie Jones, who sang "There's No Business Like Show Business" said after the show, "The worst part is waiting for the curtain to open." Once the curtain was opened, the audience of 550 watched a fast-paced two-hour show that had all the markings of an old-time vaudeville show. Among the most popular acts were three presented by local youngsters. Missy Garner's Majorettes performed baton twirling and acrobatics to Michael Jackson's "Thriller." Kim Turpin's "Red Garter Wild West Show" featured acrobatics and dancing, and the third, Patty Sallee's

"Dance Company" performed a can-can routine. ... Several other residents also displayed their singing talents as featured soloists, including Bobby Holder in "Embraceable You," Kris Thomale in "The Good Ship Lollipop" and the '20s salute, and balladeer Debbie Marcum. ... A red-clad trio comprised of Vicki Humphrey, Reida Helton and Rita Brown had audience members clapping to the beat of "In the Mood." They also performed "Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy of Company B." At the beginning of the show, revue chairman Kathy Haddix and other club members asked the musical question "Ain't We Got Fun?" ... Performing the music for the singers and dancers were percussionist Steve Tucker and pianist Sharon Rutherford.

-Easter will not be the only holiday observed on March 30. It is also "Doctor's Day" in Pulaski County. Joyce Clark, president of the Pulaski County Medical Auxiliary, said the day has been commemorated in the county for the past 30 years. Clark said the local auxiliary plans to honor a doctor at its annual dinner and dance at 7 p.m. Saturday night in the community room at Quality Courts. Dr. Veryl F. Frye, who has performed surgery in Somerset for 17 years, will receive a plaque saluting his service to the community. Frye is leaving Somerset to work in Richmond.

-They'll block off the streets around Fountain Square and dance to live music this Memorial Day, May 24. Dancing, games, food, crafts, classic cars, music and more are slated for the first annual spring celebration of Somer Fest. ... Bob Sams, former Downtown Somerset Development Corp. president and head of the Somer Fest steering committee, is now looking for clubs to participate in the event, which he hopes will eventually enjoy the notoriety of other festivals throughout the

state. Activities are slated to start at 10 a.m. and wind up with a sock hop at the YMCA from 8 p.m. until midnight featuring live music from the 50s and 60s. Two stages will be set up, one at Fountain Square, the other on Mt. Vernon Street, for continuous live music. ... A contest for local bands and fiddlers also is being considered, as well as hot air balloon rides and a fun run for joggers. Other attractions planned include items for sale by approximately 50 members of the Lake Cumberland Arts and Crafts League, a sheep shearing demonstration, ... a fish fry and samples of Kentucky foods to fill empty stomachs. ... While Sams said the spring festival will give tourists something to do other than going to the lake, perhaps the loftiest goal is to promote a holistic community spirit between Pulaski Countians.

-The 1986 Farmers Market in Somerset will begin Saturday, June 14, according to Hugh Haydon, executive director of Downtown Somerset Development Corporation. Haydon said the market will continue on Tuesdays and Saturdays throughout the summer and early fall, with sales beginning at 7:30 a.m. Saturdays at Fountain Square and at 1 p.m. Tuesdays in the parking lot of Somerset Gas Service. The annual charge for selling produce at the market this year has been increased from \$10 to \$50, but the daily charge of \$1 has been eliminated. Only growers from Pulaski County may participate.

NATIONAL NEWS:

-Bill Cosby, who portrays a doctor in his hit television series, will deliver the commencement address at Meharry Medical College on May 25, college officials say. "We are delighted to have Bill Cosby keynote the important occasion," said Dr. David Satcher, the president. "He exemplifies the integrity, strong character and solid values, as well as the academic

achievement, we have tried to emphasize in our students."

-Religious freedom would be hurt, not helped, by a constitutional amendment authorizing silent prayer in public schools, officials of major Protestant and Jewish groups say. "While advocates of the amendment represent it as favoring religious traditions, in truth it fails to respect the integrity of religious groups in teaching their own traditions," the spokesmen said in a letter that members of the Senate are receiving this week. "We urge you to oppose this effort to authorize government employees to ordain themselves religious leaders. This bill presents a serious threat to the integrity of our religious heritage and displays a callous disregard for the rights of religious minorities," the religious officials added. The amendment's language, intended to ease worries about forced prayer, did not sway the religious spokesmen, who asked senators "to defeat this unwise and dangerous

measure." The proposed amendment "would cast aside these traditional standards and allow a local school board or individual teacher to determine the 'proper' form of worship for all children in their care."

LOCAL FARM AND BUSINESS NEWS:

-A Nancy-area pork producer believes he can increase his herd of hogs by at least 20 percent with a new pig nursery recently installed on his farm. Gary Garner and his wife, Judy, have invested more than \$16,000 in the nursery facility, first of its kind in this part of Kentucky. The self-contained building, positioned on a concrete slab, is already in use, accommodating 240 baby pigs in a dozen four-foot by eight-foot pens in the double-decked structure. The environmentally controlled nursery allows baby pigs to be weaned at three weeks of age instead of five weeks, and saves a lot of young pigs from dying of exposure. With thermostats controlling bottle gas

heat, temperature in the nursery is maintained at 80 degrees. "With the nursery I can increase my sow herd by 24, and have pigs every five weeks instead of seven," said Garner. He has about 120 sows at the present time. Gary and Judy have gradually assumed most of the business enterprise since they joined his father, Tom Garner, in raising hogs in 1966. Tom, now retired but still active around the farm, has been in the hog business for 50 years. The Garners farm approximately 250 acres on both sides of KY 80 about three miles west of Nancy. In addition to hogs, the Garners have about 140 head of beef cattle, and raise tobacco, corn and hay. The Garners have two daughters — Mrs. Tamera Stringer, 20, and Julia, 11.
